The Armenian classes, first offered in the fall of 1978, will continue this school season in the Farmington Public School Community Education program.

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"Both will be taught expertly," said Julieann Hovanesian, who was instrumental in bringing the language classes to a location convenient for her own two sons, as well as other children living in the Farmington area.

The teachers are Dikran Toumajian, who will head up an evening class for adults, and Meri Pabuccian, who will teach an after-school session for school-aged children. The courses offered are believed to be the first in the U.S. sponsored by a public school's community education system and are open to registrants from all nearly communities.
