#### CITY OF FARMINGTON COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS (Summary)

A Regular meeting of the Farmington City Council was held Monday, August 20, 1979, in the Council Chambers, 2860 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan. Present: Mayor Richard L. Tupper, Councilmen Bennett, Buckler, Hartsock, City Manager Deadman, Director Byrnes, Director Billing, Attorney Kelley and Clerk Viane were also present.

Minutes of the previous meeting were approved.  
Minutes of other boards and commissions were received and/or filed.  
Council appointed Director Earl Billing as city representative to the Oakland County Public Works Advisory Council.  
Council supported the Wayne County Board of Public Works in requesting additional public hearings by the Detroit Water and Sewer Department, regarding sewerage rate increases.

Council supported the City of Novi resolution urging the General Revenue Sharing Program be continued.  
Council supported the resolution of the First Michigan Congress on the Arts which encourages the use of public buildings for art performances and exhibitions.

Council authorized and appropriated \$166.92 in support of the Farmington Youth Assistance Summer Activities Center Program.

The following resolutions were adopted:  
Allocating \$1,576.00 to the Farmington Building Authority to fund additional expenses incurred in the construction of the 47th District Court facility.

Appointing National Bank of Detroit as paying agent for the City of Farmington General Obligation Water Bonds.

Authorizing the City Manager to sign contract with the Michigan Department of Transportation for maintenance of Grand River for a period of July 1, 1979 thru September 30, 1981.

Authorizing the purchase of Public Officials Liability Insurance

Approving the Historical Marker project and expenditure of \$2,000 for the construction of the project.

Council authorized the City Manager in cooperation with the Historical Commission to conduct a study as to methods of preservation of the Governor's Mansion as an integral part of the city's history.  
City Manager Deadman advised council of change in rubbish pickup at Heritage Village West Condominiums.

The following financial reports were received and filed:

-Water & Sewer 4th Quarter ended June 30, 1979  
-47th District Court 12 months ended June 30, 1979

The Department of Public Services Quarterly Report, April to June, 1979, was received and filed.

Monthly bills were approved for payment.  
The meeting was adjourned at 9:30 p.m.

# Lakers a threat in GOAL

One thing dominates the Greater Oakland Athletic League (GOAL) football season — uncertainty.

Picking preseason favorites in the GOAL is like betting on the Detroit Lions — chance at best. In the last six years, only twice have there been clear-cut champions.

Four times the title was shared by two teams, and last year, it was almost a three-way tie.

Entering the final week of league contests, Bloomfield Hills Andover, Rochester and West Bloomfield each had a 3-1 record. Andover and Rochester won their final games, but West Bloomfield was upset by Milford and finished in a tie for second.

And who was the preseason favorite? Clarkston, coming off a 9-1 banner year in 1977, was expected to be among the challengers but finished in the basement.

"Says something about the league, doesn't it?" said West Bloomfield head football coach Dominic Livedoti. "It's a good, balanced league."

The Lakers ended with a 5-4 record last season, with much of the scoring coming from one of the most prolific passing combinations in the area.

HALF OF THAT attack is gone from this year's squad. Quarterback Jay Sul-

livan graduated, but his favorite target, Chris Mayone, will be back.

Mayone (6-foot-2, 175 pounds) hauled in 23 receptions last year, for 585 yards and nine touchdowns. And as strange as it seems, it was his first year at the position. He started at quarterback his sophomore year but Sullivan beat him out last season.

Mayone is now going to return to his former position, quarterback. But he's going to need plenty of help if West Bloomfield is going to challenge for the conference title.

Seven players are back this season and will fill 14 of the squad's positions. The strongest point is defensive backfield, where Mayone will be joined by Gary Schroeder (5-8, 155) and Bob Fascetti (5-8, 160).

Schroeder will also see action as a running back and Fascetti will play at the wide receiver post.

Four linemen round out the returning starters for Livedoti: Andre Kingston (6-1, 190), at both offensive and defensive tackle positions; Rick Mickley (5-10, 155), at defensive end and tight end; Matt Alexander (6-2, 210), offensive and defensive tackle; and Bill Rosin (5-10, 165), offensive and defensive end.

All are seniors except Kingston, who is a junior.

The rest of the positions are unsettled, and that's just the way Livedoti wants it.

"WE'VE BEEN AS competitive as possible in the other positions, the coach, now in his sixth season at West Bloomfield, said. "That is what we have tried to establish."

"We think the people coming back will be in our skill positions. Now we're looking for people who fit into the mold. We have both sophomores and seniors competing."

Livedoti knows his team lacks experience and, as far as size goes, "this is the smallest team we've had since I've been here."

But he isn't counting his team out. And he refuses to call it a rebuilding year.

"I don't like the word 'rebuilding.' We'll be respectable but inexperienced."

"We're concentrating on team quickness and team effort. We're going to have some nasty little people coming after you. We're going to have to have some effort from everyone."

Vince Kenwell (5-11, 165) is the lone senior in the group. Livedoti has been impressed with "his quick feet" and figures he will get some playing time at both offensive and defensive tackle.

OTHERS WHO HAVE have im-

pressed Livedoti are Mark Adler (6-0, 200) as an offensive tackle; Kelly Christenson (5-8, 150) at both offensive and defensive back; Joe Fayborycz (5-7, 150) at offensive and defensive back; and kicker, Jim Hinsberg (5-10, 155) as a flanker and defensive end; and Jeff Long (5-10, 175) at quarterback and linebacker. All are juniors.

Even though a fortune teller would have a hard time picking the conference champion, Livedoti thinks three of the teams are better than the rest.

"Rochester and Andover have a chance of repeating," he said. "And Clarkston has a lot of personnel returning. Milford, Kettering and West Bloomfield have lost a lot."

"Rochester is the team to look out for."

As for the Lakers and their season, one thing is certain. They'll make at least one trip to the Pontiac Silverdome.

It might not be for the Class A football championships in November, but they open against Waterford Township as part of a prep doubleheader on Sept. 7.

It won't be hard for Livedoti to get his troops ready for that one. And that's about the only safe prediction concerning the GOAL season.
