## She teaches the business of being an artist

Teaching artists to be pragmatic in the market place appears to be a tall order.

And yet, that's the task that Nancy LeBeau Thayer has set for herself.

Mrs. Thayer, a resident of Lathrup Village and an artist married to another artists, will teach a course for Oak-land Community College this fall called "The Business of Being an Artist."

A Michigan native, Mrs. Thayer lived in Royal Oak, moved to Saginaw for a

time, and now is a new resident of Lathrup Village. She is married to Rus-sell Thayer, a successful sculptor. They are parents of Adam, 2, and Darin, 9. In addition to the course at OCC, Mrs. Thayer will teach a course in anatomy for artists at the Center for Creative Studies.

She earned a BA degree in math from Michigan State University and then a master of fine arts degree in painting and drawing.

"Artists taking my OCC course will get a lot of marketing know-how," she

said. "They'll get lists of galleries and art fairs nationally and internationally. "Primarily, each person will go through steps to clarify where they ul-timately want their art to go. Students artists often believe that New York is the only place to be and getting your work into museum is the only place to

"OF COURSE, that's not true. The class will describe alternatives and choices and I also give the method to get to prescribed goals."

"It's not who you know but what you know and how effectively ones goes about their business."
The course will also touch on portfolios and resume. Each student will do a portfolio and their personal resume which will be critiqued by Mrs. Thayer.
The course will run for eight weeks and will-focus on the important questions that face aritists ruch as: What does it mean to be an artist? And: How can an artist most effectively market his or her own work?
Some of the weekly topics will con-

cern personal goals, how to achieve them, how to create a reputation, 10 alternatives to galleries, and how to create growth and progress. Each class session, at the Orchard Ridge Campus, will be two hours long. Two classes are planned. First, a morn-I wo classes are planned. First, a morning class from 10 a.m. to noon on Tuesdays and an evening course from 7-9 p.m. Thursdays.

MRS. THAYER is widely recognized for her innovative approaches to personal growth and creativity through art. She has taught, lectured and served as a consultant

as a consultant.
Her paintings have appeared in more
than 30 individual and invitational exhibitions in galleries and musuem in
this country and in Mexico.
They can also be found in numerous
corporate collections.
Mrs. Thayer said the OCC course
grows purely out of her own experience.

"Going to a gallery to try to get your work in can be humiliating and degrading," she said. "But it doesn't have to be. It can be a dignified experience if you present yourself properly.
"I know. I've done it both ways," she said.
