High School Athletic Association works on playoff system

The Michigan State High School Athletic Association (MSHAA) is still trying to get the bugs out of the the high school football playoff system.

The system is based on playoff and bonus points. Teams accumulate playoff points by defeating or tying a team. They accumulate bonus points when a team thay have previously beaten wins or ties.

A team is awarded 80 points for beating a Class A team, 40 for a tie. Class B teams are worth 64 points beaten, and 32 tied. Teams defeating Class C opponents get 48 points, 24 for a tie. And teams beating Class D squads get 32 points, 16 for a tie.

In the past, both playoff and bonus points were then totalled and divided by the number of games a team played, and reported, in order to come up with an average. This average then determined whether or not a team made the playoffs.

Some teams were able to take advan-

tage of the system, according to MSHAA assistant director Lonnie Lowrey, by agreeing to play games with other teams If the scores were not reported to the MSHAA. The games thus played would not count towards the playoffs.

Teams following this procedure would have the advantage of smaller number of games played to be divided into their

The MSHAA has initiated two changes

to close off this loophole. All games, said Lowrey, "played prior to Oct. 19 will be counted whether they are reported or

In addition, playoff points will now be added separately and divided by the number of games played. Bonus points will also be added separately, then divided by nine. The two products will then be added together to come up with a total determining a team's playoff status.

The new mathematical gymnastics will also, according to Lowrey "eliminate any advantage that might be gained by scheduling only seven or eight games.

Such a complicated system might seem a lot of bother to some people, but it becomes very important for the suporters of the eight teams from each of the four classes that qualify for the playoffs.

Two teams from four regions qualify in each class which means, in the case of a number of undefeated teams in an area, somebody's bound to lose out,

Lowrey said that in 1977, 10 undefeated teams did not make the playoffs. Last year, six teams had spotless records and did not make it.

Lowrey said the system, as set up, tries to assure "that the best schools in terms of record and competition are the competitors.

"It will hopefully identify," he said, "the best teams not only on their own winloss records, but also on the win-loss records of their opponents."
