The experimenting with new and different ways of writing and printing tell me that you want to be understood and that you are working on your self image. This is also reflected in your personal pronoun I, which suggests that you will assume responsibility that will enhance your feelings of esteem.

You have a beautiful caring nature and are sensitive to the needs of others. However, you seem not to reach out and show others how much you really care. Self-consciousness is prominent in your handwriting. (Right slant, full lower loops and last hump of m's and n's higher than the preceding ones).

The formation of your small letter r's that resemble Greek e's tell me that you have some cultural orientation. This is also supported by a wide left margin.

Probably the most prominent aspect of your handwriting is your independent nature (shown by extremely short t and d stems and very few lead in strokes on words). You do not like to be

obligated to anyone, you want to do your own thinking and acting.

Your independence is often carried to the point of disregard for what others think of you. A dichotomy exists, however, in that you are extremely sensitive to criticism of your appearance even though you try to tell yourself and others that it does not matter (wide loops in your d stems).

These short, light i bars tell me that you have a timorous nature. It appears that you have been under the influence of someone with quite a strong personality.

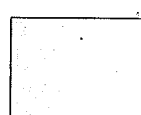
Friends soon learn they can count on your loyalty (round, close i dots).
