District shares stop light cost

The Farmington Board of Education agreed Tuesday to share one-third the cost of a stop light to be installed in front of East Junior High School — even though they know it will be months before installation occurs. The district passed the measure, which commits to a \$2,848 share of the cost which will be spill with the city of Farmington Hills and the Oakland County Road Commission. But the project cannot be launched until side walks are installed along Middlebelt between 10 and 11 Mie roads. The sidewalk installation is the responsibility of the city of Farmington Hills. The road commission will not install the traffic light until the sidewalks are in.

to the school on the west side of Middlebelt, there is no safa place to cross the street," said school adminis-trator William Prisk.

The board has been trying for months to get the light installed. Once, it withheld approval of another road commission project for a month trying to bargain for the traffic light. All attempts have failed.

The board told concerned parents at Tuesday's meeting that its hands are tied until sidewalks are installed.

"I think the city is the only one that could establish easements to build a sidewalk on the west side of Middle-belt. That is not the responsibility of the school district," said Board President Michael Shpiece.


