Images projected on the various screens created a feeling of reliving the stormy '60s as well as a re-experiencing of the Beatles. This is the real genius of the show.

The films and silides are an assemblage of '60s memorabilia that could be considered an artform on its own merit.

One of the high points of the performance was the visual onstaught depicting the time frame of the infamous

The performers who portrayed the Beatles on this outing were Joey Cura-

tio as Paul, Bob Miller as George, Rou-ert Willford as John and Ralph Castelli as Ringo. Although this quartet is only one of several who have portrayed the Beatles in the show, they showed excel-

lent composure.

Desite the tasteless premise of imitating an institution as coveted as John, George, Paul and Ringo, Robert, Bob, Joey and Ralph did a palatable job.
