

Smash crosstown rivals

North netters keep winning streak alive

North Farmington's tennis team kept their perfect record intact with a pair of one-sided victories, 7-0 over crosstown rival Farmington last Friday and 6-1 against Northwest Suburban League (NSL) opponent Redford Thurston Monday.

No. 1 singles player Uriko Kamikura, a Japanese exchange student, lost only three games in her two matches against Farmington and Thurston. Kamikura has yet to lose a set for the Raiders.

Kamikura was an easy winner over Farmington's Heather Morey, 6-0, 6-1, while No. 2 singles Jennifer Mc Elven had to go three sets before defeating

the Falcons' Brenda Zanke, 7-5, 0-6, 6-3.

North's Betsy Lee was the winner in No. 3 singles over Michelle Miele, 6-3, 6-0, while the Raiders' No. 4 singles player, Doreen Gundie, defeated Angela Fritzsche, 6-2, 6-3.

In doubles, Barb Krone and Marianne Lowry teamed to beat Farmington's Sue Murphy and Diane Mülhler, 6-0, 6-1, in the No. 1 pairing. North's Stacy Smith and Jill Robins were the winners in No. 2 doubles, beating Jane Newhouser and Molly Sharp, 6-2, 6-1.

Anne Marie Horvath and Connie Nicholson completed the shutout win for North by downing Farmington's Caro-

lyn King and Wendy Gaurie, 6-2, 6-1, in No. 3 doubles.

The win was the fourth straight for North, while Farmington's record stands at 1-2.

THE RAIDERS WON their NSL season opener against Thurston almost as handily as they defeated Farmington.

Kamikura lost two games this outing in a 6-2, 6-0 victory over Thurston's Danita Weber in No. 1 singles. Lee played No. 2 singles and also won, beating Lori Engel, 6-2, 6-3.

In No. 3 singles, McEwen downed Thurston's Donna Patrick, 6-0, 6-1, while No. 4 singles Gundie was a 6-0, 6-

1 winner over Julie Urbanas.

Krone and Lowry teamed for a No. 1 doubles victory over Karen Heyer and Sharon Porter, 6-0, 6-2, but North's No. 2 doubles team of Smith and Robins fell to Jan Gali and Barb Patrick, 4-6, 6-3, 6-3. No. 3 doubles was won by North's Sheila Wall and Carolyn Horvath, 6-1, 6-0.

The Raiders, 5-0 overall and 1-0 in the NSL, host Walled Lake Western Thursday at 4 p.m.

FARMINGTON HARRISON

Farmington Harrison came up with a split in their two meets last week,

beating Walled Lake Central, 4-3, last Friday but falling to Northville in the Western Six League (WSL) opener Monday by a 6-1 score.

In the Central meet, all four Harrison singles players won, but all three doubles teams lost. No. 1 singles Joanne Gorte defeated Central's Debbie Choler, 6-4, 6-1, while the Hawks' No. 2 singles Claudia Mondella won over Lynn Minello, 6-3, 6-4.

Karen Trevis was the Harrison winner in No. 3 singles, beating Larrie Power, 7-6, 7-5, while Dee Dee Duncan downed Nancy Gruber, 6-2, 6-1 in No. 4 singles.

Central's No. 1 doubles pair of Sandy Christensen and Wendy Wilson defeated Liz Kaviell and Lisa Berk, 6-3, 6-2. In No. 2 doubles, Harrison's Lisa Goldstein and Mary Forish lost to Pam Smith and Brooke Pitts, 6-4, 6-0, while Central's team of Linda and Lisa Paine defeated Les Te Pfaffman and Sue Gorte, 6-4, 6-1, in No. 3 doubles.

Against Northville, only No. 3 singles Trevis could manage a win, as she beat Lisa Gejoff, 6-3, 4-6, 6-3. No other Hawk netter won a set.

Harrison, 2-3 on the season and 0-1 in the WSL, hosts Waterford Mott Thursday at 3:45 p.m.

Brother Rice faces powerhouse challenge in Ohio

Birmingham Brother Rice's football team will travel to Cincinnati, Ohio, Saturday and play "the greatest team in America," according to Warrior coach Al Fracassa.

Brother Rice, currently 2-0 this season with a fourth-place state ranking in the Detroit Free Press and an eighth-place rating in the Detroit News, will battle perennial power Moeller High School of Cincinnati at 8 a.m.

More than 15,000 prep football fans are expected to watch these two state powers meet on the gridiron.

Last season, the Warriors' trip south turned into a pleasant excursion, as Rice upended Barborton, Ohio, by one touchdown.

This year's Ohio task will be more difficult, however, with the Warriors facing a 3-0 Moeller squad which has lost only one game in the last six years.

The one setback came last year in the Ohio state championship when Moeller lost to Princeton, 12-12, on a

37-yard field goal with only seven seconds left in the game.

Last week, Moeller revengeed that setback with a 34-7 trouncing of Princeton before 22,000 fans. Moeller's other two victories were a 49-0 thrashing of Finley, Ohio, and a 30-13 opening-season victory over last year's Pennsylvania champion, Pittsburg Penns Hill.

MOELLER COACH Jerry Faust has become somewhat of a legend at his school. He has coached the football team for 21 years and is currently the school's athletic director. He has 76 varsity players (none of whom play both offense and defense), 78 junior varsity players and 152 freshman graders, according to Fracassa.

"They do a great job," the Rice coach said. "(The) guy's a great coach. He does have the finest football team I've ever seen."

Faust, who has six Moeller graduates playing on this year's Notre Dame football team, has seen Rice twice — once in the Warriors' setback to North Farmington in the state semifinals last season and again last year in Rice's

12-7 victory over Grosse Pointe North. He was equally full of high praise for the Warriors.

"I think they are an excellent football team," Faust said. "They looked to be bigger and more physical last year, but I was very much more impressed (this year). I think this team is much quicker."

"I see a lot of football, and they are in top condition," Faust added. "They are really a hungry bunch of kids which is a credit to Fracassa — a great

motivator. They are disciplined kids and team-type kids."

"I think these are the kind of qualities that make a great team."

FAUST NOW is concerned with Rice's spot on his schedule. Moeller comes off that big Ohio win last week and must play Cleveland St. Edwards — one of the best teams in northeast Ohio — next week.

"This is a psychological thing. The National High School Service said we

have the toughest high school (football) schedule in the nation," Faust said.

Moeller, mainly a power-running and passing football team playing from multiple sets, also has two of the nation's top 25 players, according to the high school service.

Joe Atke, a 6-foot-6, 215-pound center, and Rick Mayler, a 6-3½, 215-pound linebacker are the two top prospects.

The young Rice is led by speedy half-

back Jim Browne and quarterback-defensive back Brian Brennan.

THE WARRIORS will take a charter bus to Cincinnati, arriving around 3:30 p.m. after the six-hour trip. They will eat at Perfidio's restaurant about two blocks from the stadium. From the diner, the team will go straight to the stadium. After the game, they will stop at La Rose's Pizzeria before coming straight home to Birmingham.

Rice victorious over GP North

The Brother Rice Warriors rolled up 355 yards total offense against Grosse Pointe North on Saturday. Brian Brennan led the team with 128 yards rushing and 92 yards passing. He ran for one touchdown and threw to Charlie Dillon for another.

And for all that, the Warriors won by only six points, 15-7.

Brother Rice stopped itself more effectively than Grosse Pointe North did, losing the ball five times on fumbles.

Brennan started the scoring in the second quarter, lugging the ball 66 yards for a touchdown. Jim Ostrowski kicked the extra point for a 7-0 Rice lead.

North came back in the third quarter, Bob Baker scoring on a 15-yard run to tie the game.

But Brennan and the Warriors responded in kind. He hit Dillon, still in the third quarter, with a 41-yard touchdown pass to give Brother Rice the win.

The Warriors were stubborn on defense, allowing North only 171 yards total offense, 163 on the ground and eight in the air.

Seniors Mark Moore and Kevin Kennedy led the Rice defenders with 11 tackles each.

Rice plays next on Saturday when it makes its annual pilgrimage to Ohio — this year to play Cincinnati Moeller. Game time is 8 p.m. Tickets, at \$2 for students and \$4 for adults, are available at Brother Rice High School.

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
