She stresses that periodic critique is one of the highlights of the class, and the class is limited in number.

His interests include photography, racketball, skiing, camping, canoeing and traveling. His hope is to combine these pastimes into some new Y classes.

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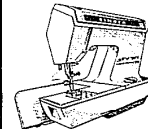
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
