

North netters streak to 7th straight victory

North Farmington's tennis team found the competition easy last week, as the Raiders stretched their unbeaten streak to seven straight by routing Farmington Harrison Tuesday and Walled Lake Western Thursday, both by 7-0 scores.

North had little problem with either team, losing only two sets in the two meets. Yuriko Kamikura, a Japanese exchange student who plays No. 1 singles for North, kept her unbeaten streak alive by winning both of her matches in straight sets. She has yet to lose a set for the Raiders.

Against Harrison, Kamikura defeated Joanne Gorte, 6-0, 6-2, while in the Western meet she was just as overpowering, claiming a 6-1, 6-0 win over Holly Spencer.

Only No. 3 singles Jennifer McEwen lost a set for North against Harrison, as

she beat Dee Duncan, 1-6, 6-2, 6-1. Doreen Gundie, the Raiders No. 4 singles, was a 6-1, 6-1 winner over Lisa Berk of Harrison. In the other singles match, No. 2 Betsy Lee defeated Harrison's Karen Trevis, 6-0, 6-2.

In doubles, North's No. 1 team of Barb Krone and Marianne Lowry won by default over Anita Liwazer and Leslie Pfaffman. The No. 2 pair of Stacy Smith and Jill Robins defeated Harrison's Liz Kavieff and Mary Forsh, 6-0, 6-2, while the No. 3 of Sheila Wall and Carolyn Horvath were 6-2, 6-0 winners over Sue Gorte and Lisa Goldstein.

In the Western meet, North's Lee won in No. 2 singles, 6-1, 6-0, over Regina Roberts; McEwen won the No. 3 singles by a 3-6, 6-0, 6-4 score against Cindy Kallors; and Gundie claimed the No. 4 singles with a 6-0, 6-0 whitewash of Debbie Salisz.

In the doubles, Krone and Lowry defeated Sandy Bordinan and Michelle Bryant, 6-0, 6-0, in the No. 1 competition; Smith and Robins downed Brenda Sugar and Julie Jenkins, 6-2, 6-0; and Wall and Horvath were 6-1, 6-0 winners over Mary Blum and Kim Marshick, in the No. 3 pairing.

North will try to keep its winning streak alive when it hosts Livonia Franklin Monday. The Raiders will play Westland John Glenn Wednesday at John Glenn, if the courts are resurfaced. Otherwise the meet will be played at North.

Farmington's dual-meet win streak was halted at four by Milford Lakeland, 23-32, in an Inter Lakes League meet last Thursday.

John Murphy managed a first-place finish for the Falcons, but any hopes for a meet victory ended there, as Farmington's next man, Bill Anglin, finished sixth.

Steve Madonis was seventh for the Falcons, with Bill Atkinson eighth and Tom Feiten 10th. The loss left Farmington at 4-1 overall and 1-1 in the ILL.

Falcon swimmers win 1st

Farmington opened its swim season with an easy tri-meet win over Redford Union and Novi last Thursday in Farmington's pool.

The Falcons captured eight of the 11 events enroute to scoring 113 points. RU finished second with 87, with Novi last with 74.

Farmington is the defending Inter Lakes League champion, but the Falcons will have no chance to defend that title. Millage problems have forced Pontiac Northern, Walled Lake Central and Waterford to drop swimming, and Milford Lakeland never competed in the sport.

With only Livonia Stevenson and Farmington having swimming squads, Falcon Coach Mark Holdridge has been rounding up opponents for his team to swim.

"This is supposed to be a rebuilding year for us," Holdridge said of the season outlook. "We lost nine seniors, but we got a lot of good 10th graders. It looks like we might be pretty good."

Sophomores Margaret Richards, Kim Pogue and Dawn Stanton may make Farmington more than pretty

good. Richards was a double winner in the tri-meet, winning the 50- and 100-yard freestyle events (27.8 in the 50, 1:00.8 in the 100).

Pogue won the 200-yard freestyle (2:03.0), setting a varsity record and qualifying for the state meet. Stanton claimed the first in the 100-yard backstroke (1:10.8) and combined with Sally Schueler, Amy Edwards and Laura Edwards to win the 200-yard medley relay (2:04.4).

"I SWAM SOME of the younger kids in this one," Holdridge explained. "Just to try and let them prove themselves."

Holdridge is counting on his veterans, Schueler and both Edwards girls, to pace the Falcons. Schueler turned in a solid performance by winning the 200-yard individual medley (2:26.7).

Other Farmington winners were Jennifer Radliff in diving (160.15) and Angela Gore in the 100-yard breaststroke (1:15.8).

The Farmington tankers take on cross-town rival North Farmington in a dual meet in Farmington's pool on Tuesday.
