

Opponents won't challenge local gridders

The offense then took over, adding a touchdown and a field goal to ice the victory. But it was the defense that won this one for the Hawks.

Quarterback Bruce Morrison had another good day for Harrison, throwing a 24-yard touchdown pass to Reggie Upshaw and scoring another on a six-yard run. He completed four of seven passes for 72 yards.

Running back Ken Kopko gained 87 yards rushing on 22 carries and full-back Jim Miller had 53 yards on 10 attempts.

This week, Harrison travels to Waterford Mott on Friday while Farmington entertains Milford Lakeland and North opens its home season against Redford Thurston on Saturday.

Here's a look at these games and my predictions on the winners (I still haven't missed — my prediction record is 9-0).

FARMINGTON — LAKELAND
Farmington is getting closer every week to putting it all together. Against Central, the team still made mistakes (a fumble on fourth and one at the Central one-yard line), but the important thing is the Falcons still won.

Milford Lakeland might not be so easy, and for a very good reason: it was embarrassed by Saginaw Arthur Hill last Saturday, 62-0.

"I'd be so hopping mad after a loss like that, I would make sure my kids were sky high for the next game," Farmington Coach Hal Beardsley said. "Plus, it's their league opener, so everything else before is water over the dam — it doesn't mean a thing."

Lakeland has only 28 players on the team, eight of which are sophomores. The team won its opener over South Lyon, then lost its second contest

against Hartland by two points.

Regardless of how the Lakeland players feel, Farmington should be feeling good, coming off a victory. Beardsley made several personnel changes last week and has a few more in mind.

Quarterback is one position where changes will be made every week. Against Central, Tom Rogers started but didn't last out the first quarter before Dave Schultz, the starter the two previous weeks, replaced him.

Schultz will start this week, but Beardsley is quick to point out that he'll go with whoever has the hot hand.

To win this one, Farmington is going to have to find that killer instinct and take advantage of the opponents' mistakes. That's the one thing the Falcons haven't developed yet.

The game will be played on Farmington's field Saturday afternoon at 2 p.m. The Falcons should emerge from the contest with a 2-0 Inter Lakes League record. **PICK — FARMINGTON.**

NORTH — THURSTON

North lost its opening game against Flint Southwestern, which is too bad, because otherwise the Raiders might have a shot at the playoffs.

The team has jelled, combining an overpowering defense with a potent offense. The running attack was expected to be tough, with Nutter and Cohen both big and fast backs.

But now Goldstein is beginning to develop as a capable passer, and if it continues, North will be very tough to beat.

Being tough to beat is one thing Redford Thurston isn't. It has lost three straight games, the latest to Redford Union by a 35-0 score. Rich Ridd is the

leading Thurston runner — he scored twice in the loss to Oak Park.

It's the home opener for North after three straight road games. A problem for Coach Ron Holland might be keeping his team from looking ahead — the Raiders play unbeaten, unscathed upon Redford Union next week.

Saturday's contest begins at 2 p.m. This one's easy to pick. **PICK — NORTH.**

HARRISON — MOTT

Harrison walked to its third straight win of the season last week behind its best defensive performance of the year.

But don't get carried away just yet, Hawk fans. Harrison hasn't had much of a schedule, and the tough ones are yet to come.

The three opponents Harrison has beaten have a combined record of 2-7 (Farmington and Northville are 1-2, Birmingham Groves is 0-3). And this

week's opponent is the worst yet.

Waterford Mott has done nothing right all season. It's last loss was to Livonia Churchill by a 41-0 margin, in which it managed only 86 total yards and surrendered 317.

The Hawks should have no problem beating Mott. The game is at Mott Friday night, and will be the first time Harrison has played under the lights this season, if you want to count that as a Mott advantage.

It's the only one Mott will have.

Harrison entertains Walled Lake Western, another mediocre team, next week before going against the only team that will threaten Coach John Herrington's Hawks — Livonia Churchill. Harrison should be 5-0 going into the contest with Churchill.

Friday's game with Mott begins at 7:30 p.m. Another easy pick. **PICK — HARRISON.**

Amendatory Ordinance No. C-4-79 (1) was introduced — corrections of Section number in the Subdivision of Land Ordinance, Chapter 61, Section 61.590.

City Managers recommendation to approve to contract for participation with Department of Transportation, construction of median crossover at Northwestern Highway north of Inkster Road was approved.

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CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS CITY COUNCIL MEETING SEPTEMBER 17, 1979

The City Council of the City of Farmington Hills held a special meeting at the City Administration Center on September 17, 1979. Mayor Oppertbauer opened the meeting at 7:30 p.m. Councilmembers present were Soronen, Jones, Deacon, Smith, Alkateeb and Dolan. Others present were City Manager Savage, City Clerk Cairns and City Attorney Bibeau.

After the Cost Hearing for Water Improvement on Nine Mile Road, SAD C135 the assessment roll was confirmed in the amount of \$30,000.

Council introduced Amendatory Ordinance No. C62-189, request to rezone from RA-2 to OS-1, lots 1, 2 and 3 of Parkhill Subdivision in Section 10, located on the west side of Orchard Lake Road between 12 and 13 Mile Road.

Amendatory Ordinance No. C62-191 was introduced to rezone lot 52 of Park Hill Subdivision and two acre parcels 23-10-277-024 and 025, from RA-2 to OS-1 and RC-2 located in Section 10 on the west side of Orchard Lake Road between 12 and 13 Mile Road.

After public hearing approval was given to demolish the buildings at 21146 Robinson, 27509 Shawwassee and 20923 Oxford.

Consideration of demolition of the building at 21411 Jefferson was adjourned to October meeting.

Approval was given for the Bond Issue for Exotic Rubber and Plastic Industrial Development Bonds in the amount of \$2,785,000.

Amendatory Ordinance C4-79, Subdivision of Land Ordinance, amendment to Chapter 61 of the City Code was enacted.

Article 1 Chapter 70, Uniform Traffic Code-Miscellaneous, Amendatory Ordinance C14-79 was enacted.

Council enacted Ordinance C62-W amending the zoning ordinance providing for amendments to City parking regulations, sign regulations and regulations for roof top structures.

Preliminary plat for Strathmore Subdivision located in Section 7, NW¼, 192 lots and 23.213 acres of open space was approved with escrow in the amount of \$18,480 and completion date of December 1, 1981.

Approval was given to extend sewer north of Boonventure Roller Rink to the Halsted Industrial Park.

Advancing money to Oakland County Drain Commission was approved for the Ten Mile Rouge Arm.

City Attorney was authorized to sign Consent Judgment re Sherry vs City of Farmington Hills.

Approval was given to place the following on the November 6, 1979 General Election ballot:

A Regular Meeting of the Farmington City Council was held Monday, September 17, 1979, in the Council Chambers, 23910 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan. Mayor Pro-tem William S. Hartsock called the meeting to order at 8:10 p.m.

PRESENT: Councilmen Benatti, Buckler, Hartsock, Yoder.
ABSENT: Mayor Richard L. Tupper

CITY OFFICIALS PRESENT: City Mgr. Deadman, Directors Billing and Byrnes, Attorney Kelley, Clerk Viane.

Minutes of the previous meeting were approved.
Minutes of other boards and commissions were received and/or filed.

A presentation and request for cable T.V. Franchise was made by Mr. John Raines and Mr. Warren Brown, for Omnicon of Michigan.

Ordinance C-451-79 was introduced which would grant a Non-Exclusive Franchise to Omnicon of Michigan, Ltd. to own, operate and maintain a Cable Television System in the City of Farmington.
