Also in September, hydrangeas are eye catchers before the leaves begin to turn color. You can cut off the flower stalks with their beautiful panicles and place in a tall container for weeks and weeks of pleasure. No water in the container. the climbing hydrangea (Hydrangea
Petiolaris). It will give a handsome display of flowers, but may take three

the Oakleaf (Hydrangea Quercifolia).
This selection will give you flowers in
summer and fall and will take deep
shade.
