

# Kopko's spree lifts Harrison

Junior tailback Ken Kopko raced for 181 yards and scored four touchdowns as Farmington Harrison buried winless Waterford Mott, 38-14, Friday night.

It was the fourth straight win for the Hawks and the third time Kopko has gained over 100 yards rushing in four games this season. Harrison had little trouble with Mott, running up a 26-0 halftime lead, but Hawk coach John Herrington wasn't pleased with his team's second half performance.

"We played very sloppy in the second half," Herrington said, referring to a pair of Mott touchdowns the defense allowed in the last two quarters.

But Harrison was never in danger, thanks to some fine running by Kopko and solid blocking by the offensive line. Kopko scored once in the opening quar-

ter on a five-yard run, capping a drive which started after the opening kickoff.

The Hawks exploded for three more touchdowns in the second quarter, with Kopko accounting for the first two on runs of eight and 35 yards, and a four-yard pass from backup quarterback Jim Macielak to end Pete Tompson. Greg Mehall kicked two extra points to make it 26-0.

Mott scored twice in the second half, with Ken Grace getting both touchdowns. The first came on a 12-yard pass from quarterback Jim Macielak in the third period, and the second was a three-yard plunge in the final quarter.

HARRISON ALSO ADDED a pair of second-half touchdowns, the first on a

75-yard run in the third quarter by Kopko and the second on a one-yard run by fullback Jim Miller in the fourth period.

The Hawks outgained Mott, 413 yards to 160. Harrison had 315 yards rushing and 98 passing to 65 rushing and 95 passing for Mott. Starting quarterback Bruce Morrison completed three of eight passes for 94 yards.

Harrison, now 2-0 in the Western Six League, hosts Walled Lake Western Saturday at 2 p.m.

FARMINGTON 14 — LAKELAND 0

Farmington overcame a "listless" first half to post a 14-0 victory over Milford Lakeland last Saturday at Farmington.

Halfback Dave Hall scored both Falcon touchdowns in the second half, the first on a four-yard run that was set up by a pass from quarterback Tom Rogers to halfback Bob Benga.

Rogers, a senior, relieved starter Dave Schultz after three plays in the second half and sparked both Farmington touchdowns drives.

"The kids were extremely listless in the first half," Falcon coach Hal Beardsley said. But the team came around in the second half behind Rogers.

Hall's second touchdown was the end result of a 65-yard drive in the fourth quarter. Hall had a 20-yard run and Benga a 15 yarder to highlight the drive. Hall scored on a five-yard run.

The quarterback situation is a problem for Beardsley, but not one he's unhappy about. Schultz started the first two games of the year, both losses, and

Rogers saw extensive action in both.

In the team's first victory over Walled Lake Central, Rogers started but Schultz relieved when Rogers was shaken up. It was Schultz who got the Falcons moving then, and it earned him the starting berth in the Lakeland game.

TECHNICALLY, Schultz is probably a better quarterback," Beardsley said. "Rogers doesn't mind coming off the bench — in fact, he prefers it. He just doesn't want to stop playing defense."

"I don't know who will start Saturday."

Whoever starts as quarterback, both Schultz and Rogers will see plenty of action on defense. And it is the defense that has sparked for the Falcons in the last two contests.

Farmington's defense hasn't allowed a point since the first quarter of the West Bloomfield game, 11 quarters ago.

The secondary allowed only 18 yards passing to Lakeland and Doug Parker, playing in only his third game as a safety, intercepted a pass for the third straight contest.

Farmington, now 2-2 overall and 2-0 in the Inter Lakes League, has a break in its conference schedule as it travels to Bay City Handy for a game Friday night. Bay City is 1-3 on the year, after that the schedule gets very tough.

The Falcons must play Waterford Township (3-1 on the season), Livonia Stevenson (3-1), Southfield (4-0) and North Farmington (2-1).

The game against Bay City will start at 7:30 p.m.

# Cranbrook '11' falls in overtime

Cranbrook gridders lost a heart-breaker to unbeaten Class A Warren Tower, falling 21-20 in overtime Saturday afternoon.

The Cranes, 1-3 overall, came back from a 14-6 halftime deficit to tie the non-league battle with a third-quarter touchdown and two-point conversion.

Cranbrook was initially on offense in the overtime session and scored on the third play — a seven-yard pass from quarterback Brian Crossman to tight end Dave Miller.

The Cranes made an extremely costly mistake on the conversion, however, when a misplay caused a delay of game and an eventual failure of a two-point conversion. After the touchdown, the kicking team raced on the field, but the Cranbrook coaching staff wanted to try for two points, according to head coach John Shoshan. The misplay caused the

five-yard penalty and eventually the game, as Tower scored on its third play from 10 yards out and converted the extra-point kick.

Shoshan admitted that many costly penalties plagued his Cranes throughout the contest, but he added, "We had a couple of big plays . . . it was without a doubt the best game we've played all season. They (Warren Tower) were a good team."

Cranbrook spotted Tower a 14-0 second-quarter lead before captain Kurt Peterson blocked a Tower punt with less than a minute remaining in the half.

Tackle Steve Albert, a 6-foot-2, 225-pounder, then picked up the loose ball and raced 45 yards for the Crane touchdown. The extra-point kick was missed, however, following a penalty.


