

Unbeaten Southfield conquers Kimball, 22-20

Forget that Southfield only picked up four first downs Friday against Royal Oak Kimball and allowed 15. Forget that the Blue Jays only picked up 204 yards total offense and allowed 256.

Remember only the final score — Southfield 22, Kimball 20.

The amazing Blue Jays did it again, keeping their perfect record unblemished at 4-0.

But they looked anything but an unbeaten team for the first quarter of the game. The Blue Jays took the opening kickoff and moved the ball out to the 50 where fullback Tom Longry fumbled.

Kimball took over and proceeded to take the Southfield defense apart.

The Knights marched 50 yards in 10 plays, with fullback Ed Rosinski bul-

ling over from two yards out for the touchdown at 6:18.

Kimball scored the next time it got the ball, going all the way from its own 44 in nine plays on the ground. Rosinski, Steve Filipis and Mike Kenealy did the heavy work for Kimball, alternating carries down to the Southfield one as the quarter came to an end.

Kenealy made the big play of the drive, sweeping right from his own 26 and lugging it down to the one. Rosinski then scored on the first play of the second quarter. The point-after was good to give Kimball a 14-0 lead.

"I think," said Southfield coach John Finlayson, "they scored a little bit too easy the first two series that they had the ball."

Anything they wanted to run they ran at will on us in the first quarter."

Southfield stiffened in the second quarter, turning back a Kimball drive at its own 20 when tackle Bob Biggs nailed Kenealy in the backfield for a one-yard loss, and a whole flock of Jays sacked quarterback Berge Young on the 35 a play later.

SOUTHFIELD TOOK over following a Kimball punt on its own 27. The Jays moved from there to the 50, most of the yardage coming on a 17-yard run by tailback Matt Buckson.

The "big-play" Jays struck from there. Quarterback Pat Charette hit Vincent Bean over the middle with a pass, and Bean made a couple of moves down the right sideline and raced into the end zone for six points.

Charette found Jim Carr in the end zone for the two-point conversion as

the Jays cut into the Kimball lead, 14-8, with 1:36 remaining.

"That woke us up," said Finlayson of Bean's scoring catch, "without that we go in at half 14-0. That brought them (Kimball) down to earth."

Kimball wasn't brought that far down to earth. The Knights started the second quarter by driving to the Southfield 23 before giving up the ball on fourth down when Southfield's Ken Sullivan dropped Kenealy in the backfield for a 10-yard loss.

Southfield missed a solid opportunity to tie the game immediately after it got the ball back. Split end Ken Mignone dropped a flea-flicker pass from Charette on the 15 with not a single Kimball defender in sight, and Southfield had to punt.

But the Jays got the ball right back.

Biggs popped a Kimball runner at the eight and Sullivan recovered. A penalty for too many players against Kimball moved the ball to the three and Charette sneaked over from there.

Mignone's extra point made it 15-14 Southfield.

THE JAYS were not through scoring. Rosinski fumbled on his own 38 during the ensuing series of players and Southfield recovered. A sneak by Charette moved it to the 34, and Longry scored on the next play, going all the way on a fullback dive. Mignone's extra point made it 22-14 Southfield with 39 seconds left in the quarter.

"They're a well-coached team," said Finlayson of Kimball, "and we played a helluva game. They're truly a great team and always have been."

Kimball did come back, with Young scoring with 48 seconds left from one yard out, but the Knights failed on the two-point conversion try.

Kimball got the ball back on the on-side kick, but after moving to the Southfield 36 the Knights stalled. Young threw three incomplete passes and Southfield won 22-20.

"They're a well-coached team," said Finlayson of Kimball, "and we played a helluva game. They're truly a great team and always have been."

Andover mauls Milford, 30-6

Bloomfield Hills Andover beat Milford 30-6 Friday, but there was little rejoicing in the locker room afterwards.

"This was a horrible game for us," said Andover coach Frank Buford, "we probably lost our quarterback (Mark Vestevich) for the season."

"Losing Mark Vestevich — that'll be a helluva blow."

Vestevich was injured early in the first quarter. Second stringer Matt Zobel came on for Vestevich and directed

the Barons to the win. A lot of Zobel's job was just handing off as the Barons rolled up 305 of their total 326 yards offense on the ground. He did, however, find receiver Matt Zobel in the end zone for one of Andover's five touchdowns.

Steve Mazur accounted for most of the Andover scoring, running for three touchdowns from five, 17 and 23 yards. Tom Kellehar added an eight-yard touchdown run.

The Andover defense limited Milford

to 157 yards total offense and kept Milford off the board until the fourth quarter.

The defense picked off four Milford passes.

The only real trouble Andover had, aside from the injury to Vestevich, was with its kicking game — the Barons failed to produce an extra-point conversion in five tries.

The Barons defeated Clarkston one week earlier by the same 30-6 score. The win brings Andover to 3-1 over-

all. Next game for the Barons will be Friday at Rochester when they play the heavies in Rochester's homecoming.
