President Jimmy Carter speaks of a "crisis of confidence," Kenneth Boulding has talked about a "decay of legitimacy," and Sen. Edward Kennedy is emphasizing a "failure of leadership."

There is no unanimity about the discontent or malady besetting the American people but it is clear that some influential people feel all is not well.

Pressing the rhetoric of these critics is a rather futile exercise. The lack of precision in our language creates such a space between reality and commentary that accountability is almost impossible to measure.

Confidence, legitimacy and leadership are heavily laden words. Coupled with such energizing words as crisis, decay and failure, they create a considerable indiscriminate ferment of mind and body of spirit.

Even more unfortunate is our own general lack of clarity in outlining the order and nature of our public life. If

we are not sure what we are to be about, it is well nigh impossible to measure what is being done against what we should do.

WHEN ZECHARIAH was a prophet in Israel during the governorship of Zerubbabel, the people were committed to the task of rebuilding the Temple and restoring the state under Prince David.

Returning from the exile in Babylon, the people were at a critical point in

their public life. And when the people went to Zechariah to seek his advice on the matter of changing the traditional month of fasting, he ignored their question and shifted the issue to the real matter at hand.

"Thus says the Lord," he told them. "Render true judgments, show kindness and mercy each to his brother, do not oppress the widow, the fatherless, the sojourner, or the poor, and let none of you devise evil against his brother in your heart."

IT WOULD BE easy and even stimulating to engage in a verbal contest with the politicians and diagnosticians of the day.

But the potential for error would be as great as the false assumption made in Zechariah's day that a change in the month of fasting would suffice as their answer to God's call for obedient service.

Zechariah called the people to a remembrance of the covenant. We need to be well-served to remember, to re-incorporate, to re-embody the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution of the United States in our thought and action process so that the rhetoric of the day will not confuse us.

Robert Frost wrote that "men stand in mercy and grace, while the secret sits in the center and knows." I like to think that with careful thought and deliberate action we might come closer to what that secret is.

Temple announces plans for Sunday speakers

Temple Emanuel-El will launch its Sunday Speakers' Series for 1979-80 with an address at 7:30 p.m. Sunday, Oct. 7, by ABC news foreign correspondent Herb Kaplow.

Kaplow has been a journalist and top political analyst for more than 25 years. In addition to reporting on five presidential campaigns, he has covered scores of major national and international events during his career.

The series will continue Nov. 4 with the Jewish "Soul Singer" Shlomo Carlebach.

Since his first record, "Songs of My Soul," Rabbi Carlebach has become an international celebrity circling the globe with his guitar strumming. Many of the melodies he sings are of his own invention and the lyrics are words of the Torah as well as a multitude of inspiring stories.

On March 8, the temple will present

a debate on capital punishment. State Rep. Richard Fessler, (R-Union Lake), a backer of a proposed amendment to the Michigan Constitution to permit capital punishment, will argue the question with Howard Simon, the Michigan director of the American Civil

Liberties Union, in the discussion. Coming to Temple Emanuel-El on May 4 will be Dr. Bruno Bettelheim, the distinguished psychoanalyst and author.

Born in Vienna, he received his doctorate in psychology from the University

of Vienna and came to this country in 1939.

Concluding the series on June 8 will be Caroline Bird, the author of "The Two Paycheck Family," "Born Female" and "The Invisible Scar."

Friedman is keynoter

Sonya Friedman, well known psychologist in this area, will be keynote speaker for a day-long management skills seminar beginning at 8:30 a.m. Wednesday, Oct. 10, at Schoolcraft college.

Titled "The Successful Woman," the seminar will include six workshops, of which participants may choose three, lunch and a fashion show of apparel for successful women.
