## CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS CITY COUNCIL MEETING SEPTEMBER 24, 1979

The City Council of the City of Farmington Hills held a regular meeting at the City Hall on September 24, 1979. Mayor Oppertbauer opened the meeting at 7:30 p.m. Councilmembers present were Soronen, Jones, Deacon, Smith, Aikateeb and Dolan. Others present were City Manager Savage, City Clerk Cairns and City Attorney Bibea.

Council enacted Amended Ordinance C62-189, lots 1, 2 & 3 of Parkhill Subdivision in Section 10, on the west side of Orchard Lake between 12 & 13 Mile Roads, rezoned from RA-2 to OS-2.

No action was taken regarding a resolution to delay the introduction of any Ordinance or conveyance of land related to the Freedom/Drake Senior/Low Income Housing project until after the November 6, 1979 City Election.

Amendatory Ordinance C10-79-1, Employee Retirement System, Section 4.230. Service Credit was introduced.

Granting of non-exclusive franchise for Cable TV in the City of Farmington Hills was referred to administration.

Request from Court Time Racquet Club, Ltd., for Official Hours Permit was tabled until next regular meeting.

Robert Beauchamp, Paul Inman, John Anhalt and Alex Terzian III were appointed to the Economic Development Corporation.

The bid for the fire apparatus was accepted.

Approval was given to waive the bid requirements and to purchase a fire vehicle through the State of Michigan Cooperative Purchasing Program.

An executive session of Council was called immediately following the meeting.

Meeting adjourned at 11:55 p.m.

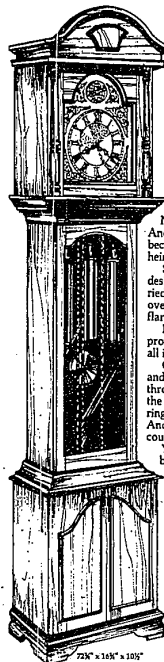
