Last week, the Chargers shut out Canton, 20-0. All three of the team's touchdowns were scored in the final 8-40 of the game, and the defense scored two of them. Canton gained only 26 total yards in the contest.

The Churchill offense isn't as strong as Harrison's, at least when the Hawks are on track. Bill Keller is the quarter-back. Keller was a one-man offensive show against Canton, completing four of 13 passes for 60 yards and leading the team's rushing game with 42 yards on 10 carries.

He scored the only offensive touchdown of the game on a nine-yard run.


