'Aging, the Art of Living' calls for meal registrations

"Aging, the Art of Successful Living," the two day conference set to run Oct. 19-20 in Mercy Center, does not require pre-registration for its agenda of workshops and events.

But the staff does ask that those planning to eat during the conference give advance notification so adequate plans may be made.

The above coupon is printed by the Farmington Observer in support of the conference. The event is sponsored by the Farmington Area Commission on Aging and made possible by a grant from Michigan Council for the Arts.

Persons over the age of 60 and their spouses are invited to lunch Friday without charge.

Those under 60 may eat in Mercy

Center's main dining room Friday at noon. The charge for the self-served meal is \$3.75 and includes second helpings.

Brunch on Saturday is without charge to all guests.

The dinner dance on Saturday is part of the regular program in The Gathering Place, the center for area seniors. Cost is \$6 for those who register and pre-pay along with the accompanying coupon.

THE ENTIRE conference is devoted to learning the art of successful aging, and there is no charge for any of the events.

Guests may choose among any or all of the sessions. They run the gamut from fun and games to emergency

medical techniques.

Speakers and peer counselors will talk and lead discussion groups on senior power, consumer guidance, senior housing, social security and the like beginning at 9 a.m. each day.

Information on resources and support services will be available to the older person in maintaining independence and well being.

Seniors will get an opportunity to learn about new roles through education, employment, and volunteer work.

Family members who live with an older person will particularly benefit from the conference. Students in the field of gerontology and staff members from agencies who deal with the older person are encouraged to attend.

'Prisoner of Second Avenue' opens Nov. 2 in the barn

Ralph Rosati, the actor who dispatched the villain so adeptly in Farmington Players' summer melodrama, takes the lead role in "The Prisoner of Second Avenue," which opens in the players' barn Friday, Nov. 2.

Rosati will play Mel Edison, a middle-aged Manhattan advertising executive who loses his job suddenly, and his sanity, by degrees, throughout the course of the Neil Simon comedy.

Rosati, who directed "The Importance of Being Earnest" for the players this year, also appeared in their productions of "Hay Fever" and "The Bat." Cast as Mel's understanding wife, Edna, is Judie Tibbitts, who also appeared in the summer play, "Caught in the Villain's Web." Playgoers will also remember her in "Twelfth Night" and "Hay Fever."

Both Rosati and Ms. Tibbitts live in Farmington Hills.

John Powers returns to the players after several years absence to take the role of Harry, Mel's long-suffering older brother. Powers has appeared on-stage at the University of Detroit, the Altie Theatre

and Somerset Dinner Theatre. He is also a Farmington Hills resident.

CAST AS Mel's three disapproving sisters are Kathleen Monticello, of Detroit, Joyce Moore of Birmingham, and Sue Redmond of Franklin. Ms. Moore and Ms. Redmond are making their first appearance with Farmington Players.

Also included in the cast are John Knock, of Farmington Hills, Steve Kachmachyk of Farmington, David Hertzberg of Detroit and Vicki Merrick of Livonia.

"The Prisoner of Second Avenue" will run Nov. 2-4, 8-11, and 15-17.

Performances will be at 8:30 p.m. Thursday, Friday and Saturday, and at 7:30 p.m. Sunday.
