THE GUILD'S membership of about 58 women has bought everything from toasters to blankets for the 12 mobile momen that house the actors during their stay on the Oakland University campus near Rochester.

Last year, the guild raised \$1,700 from the Luncheon on the Aisle. This year, because of the sold-out house, even more money will go toward making the actors comfortable.

The professional acting company for each production is in residence for six weeks respectively. Weeks rehearsing and 3½ weeks performing.

To arrival, there's a basket of delectable foods and a welcoming glass of whe in each performer's trailer. The repast is provided by the guild, which also makes sure television sets in the trailers are in good working order.

The guild gives a Sunday brunch for each cast and holds this gathering in a member's home, so the actors may nifeet both husbands and wives and become more acquainted with the community.

AFTER MS. ARNOLD prepped the audience with her vocal rendition of "Life Upon the Wicked Stage" (Ain't Nothing What a Girl Supposes), she discussed some myths about the theater.

She claimed it's not that actors love applause because they want to bask in their own egos but, instead, that hearing applause is a signal to performers that they are communicating — which is their goal.

Ms. Arnold added what she termed a personal comment remarking. "The

She continued, "There will be times you will be insulted, mad — If it's not propaganda — you don't have to like it."




