## It's an elegant era of romance

However, "Bridal gowns are not as seasonal as they used to be," said James Hjelm, the handsome designed for Priscilla of Boston, "Although we have done a fox fur trim gown for winter, the white fox fur cuffs detach and the gown is just as wearable for sommer. Today, brids will wear satin in the summer and sheer in the winter."

Actually, the dashing young Bostonian traces his designing ways and his romantic nature back to the age of six. "All through school I sketched clothing, always ending with a bridal gown. And, as a very young lad, when confined to the house for one reason or another, I cut scraps of cloth to make bridal gowns for dolls."

After Hjelm completed design training at Boston's New England School of Design he decided to focus his attention on bridal wear. Although he entered the clothing field designing and creating general clothing, his real love continued to be bridal. He has "stuck with it

for 17 years," and plans to stick with it for the remainder of his active design career, he said.

TO COMPLEMENT the new opu-lence, Hjelm advises men to take their cue from the bride. Traditional cloth-ing such as a cut-away tuxedo or morn-ing suits in traditional colors give an mg suits in traditional colors give an elegant background for the bride's ele-gance. He also advises bridesmaids to be very lady-like and feminine in soft chiffons or crepes.

"Modified disco dresses in jersey are not a part of the opulent wedding," he cautioned.

"It ravel to work with the brides," said Hjelm. "A lot of them say 'Don't bring me anything with lace or beads, just bring me something simple.' But the minute they get into one of the beautful gowns, they are awestruck with their own images. This is why the traditional gowns remain."


