FARMINGTON — SOUTHFIELD

Quoting "Saturday Night Live's" Roseanne Roseannadanna, "It's not one thing, it's another. But it always something."

That sums up Farmington's football season as well as anything. The Falcons lost by a touchdown in the season opener to Harrison, by two points to West Bloomfield in the second game, won their next two games before being beaten by Bay City Handy, Waterford and Stevenson. With two games remaining in the season, the combined records of Farmington's opponents is 40-23.

If that isn't enough opposition, Farmington has had to fight injury problems and even the officiating. In last Saturday's game with Stevenson, Farmington's Jim Greshover intercepted a Stevenson pass and took it in for a potential game-tying touchdown. But the score was called back because an official accidentally whistled the play dead. Stevenson scored two touchdowns in the next two minutes to put the game on ice.

The Falcons hope such problems won't occur this Saturday against Southfield, because they'll have their hands full against Southfield without them. Starting Blue Jay quarterback Pat Charette broke two ribs in last Friday's 21-14 loss to Hazel Park, the first setback of the season for Southfield. Still, the Jays almost pulled it out, driving to the five-yard line behind backup quarterback Mark Jewett.

Jewett may start in

place of Charette, but the player to watch on Southfield is senior Vincent Bean. He intercepted two passes last Friday against Hazel Park, returning one 50 yards for a score. He also ran 70 yards for Southfield's second score and finished the game with 114 yards rushing on eight carries.

Farmington will be playing with third-string quarterback Mark Sardo at the helm. Dave Schultz and Tom Rogers, who shared the spot for the first six weeks of the season, are out with injuries. Schultz hurt his shoulder against Bay City Handy and Rogers broke his arm last week in practice.

Farmington will have to go to beat Southfield. There are several interesting sidelights to the game as well. Southfield coach John Finlayson's son, Greg, plays for Farmington. And Finlayson, Farmington coach Hal Bearder, and Southfield's father all played for Redford and

grew up in the same neighborhood. Those inter-relationships alone should make the contest interesting. It'll be the first time for both squads in the Silverdome so neither will have an advantage. scored two touchdowns to lead North to a 17-7 win. That could spell trouble for Harrison. But the Hawks have their own arsenal of offensive weapons, starting with tailback Ken Kopko. The junior has rushed for

over 100 yards in five of the team's seven games this season. Quarterback Bruce Morrison is an effective passer at times, and he has a fine set of receivers in Dave Prestel and Reggie Upshaw. The defense

is solid but not great. This is a tough game to pick, and it should be decided on who gets the big break. North's slight edge in experience, especially playing on AstroTurf, has me leaning in that direction. PICK — NORTH.

play of the quarter. Doug Pierce recovered for North at the Raider 40-yard line.

IT TOOK North eight plays and a personal foul penalty against Glenn to score. Goldstein kept the ball on an option run to the right, circled the end and raced 20 yards for the touchdown. Nutter's kick put the Raiders in front, 10-7.

North got good field position at its 46 meters later after Glenn punter Charles Baronscheer's kick traveled only 25 yards. The Raiders kept the ball on the ground, going 54 yards in seven plays and using three minutes off the clock.

Goldstein scored again on the same option play to the right, this time from 21 yards out. Nutter kicked his second conversion, making the final score 17-7.

It was the second year in a row that North has bested Glenn in what has in recent years become one of the big Northwest Suburban League (NSL) rivalries. The Raiders had beaten Glenn all but one time between 1965 and 1974, but then Glenn won three straight years.

"That got us kind of upset," Holland said. The last of those victories, in 1977, knocked North out of the state playoffs and gave the championship to Glenn.

Neither team was playing for those kind of stakes Saturday. Both had 3-3 records going into the contest, and Redford Union had clinched the NSL title by beating Livonia Franklin, 14-0, Friday.

Hawks crush foe

It had to be the low point of the season for coach Dave Schule and his Plymouth Canton football team. Farmington Harrison battered and bruised the Chiefs Saturday with a 49-0 victory behind the rushing of junior halfback Ken Kopko, who gained 167 yards in 17 carries and played less than three quarters.

It was the Chiefs' sev-

enth straight loss this season without a win and was the eighth defeat in a row since 1978.

Harrison, coached by John Harrington, raised its overall mark to 4-1. The Hawks, who reached the state finals in 1976, settled for second place in the Western Six League behind Livonia Churchill.

Harrison lost the league title two weeks ago to the Livonians, 7-6. "I'm glad the kids

came back," said Harrington. "We were kind of devastated by the Churchill loss."

"We showed that we are a better offensive team today. "We didn't make the big plays against Churchill. Today, we got a few lucky breaks early."

IT WASN'T luck, though, that helped the Chiefs. Harrison coach
