

Big Football Season Ends For Clarenceville

All in all, it was a fine football season for Clarenceville High.

In recent years, an "also-ran" well down the list in the Wayne-Oakland League standings, the Trojans came in third this year.

Only mighty Bloomfield

Andover and West Bloomfield edged them out.

The Trojans wound up the year in roaring fashion Friday, routing Crestwood, 59-21.

"I'd say that this was our finest showing of the year...and we had some good

ones," said a proud Ralph Weedle, the Clarenceville coach.

THE TROJANS ran up 365 yards rushing and 143 more passing.

Bob Ridling and Rob Weller, the one-two running punch,

closed in dramatic fashion. Each logged the ball for 150 yards.

Ridling finished the season with a total of 1,099 yards on the ground while Weller, who'll be back next season, collected 927 for the campaign in which Clarenceville won six, lost two

and tied one.

Mike Duman at quarterback rifled passes that netted Clarenceville 143 and also two touchdowns.

DEFENSIVELY, Clarenceville had another fine night, with Weller's 80-yard run with

an intercepted pass for a TD the highlight.

Chuck Kojdzick started the touchdown barrage for Clarenceville when he sprinted over from the 11. Then Ridling, went 20 yards to make it 12-0 for the Trojans at the end of the first quarter.

Guard Lennie Dicks poured through to spill the Crestwood quarterback for a safety in the second period of the game.

IN THE THIRD period, Weller smacked over from one and then Duman picked out Ridling and hit him with a TD

pass that covered 45 yards. Weller dashed with his interception in the fourth period before Duman found Weller in the later stages of the game on a 45-yard pass for the final touchdown of what Clarenceville truthfully had reason to celebrate.

Can Schoolcraft Booters Win Trip To Sunny Miami?

Schoolcraft College's soccer team hopes to be singing that song next weekend after winding up the Region 12 National Junior College Athletic Association tournament at Bay City.

There are four teams in the running—Schoolcraft, Delta, Macomb and Lorain. The latter is from Ohio.

Lorain, the only team to beat Schoolcraft during the recent regular season, will be the favorite.

The opening pairings Friday match Schoolcraft against Macomb and Delta vs. Lorain. The winners play for the trip to Miami on Saturday.

SCHOOLCRAFT took the league crown with a record of four victories and a tie. Ma-

comb was second with three wins and two ties. Delta finished third with 3-1-1.

"It's a tough job facing us," said Marv Gans, the Schoolcraft coach. "If we're to beat Delta and Lorain and win that trip to Miami."

"But it sure would be nice to spend Thanksgiving week in Florida."

Schoolcraft's cross country team finished 13th while Oakland College's Orchard Ridge from Farmington was 15th in the Michigan Community College's annual meet.

Grand Rapids took the team title with 30 points, beating out Flint with 59 and Oakland Highland Lakes with 102.

Schoolcraft had 345 points and Orchard Ridge 397.

Paul Baldwin of Flint was the individual winner in the four-mile run in 20:12 minutes.

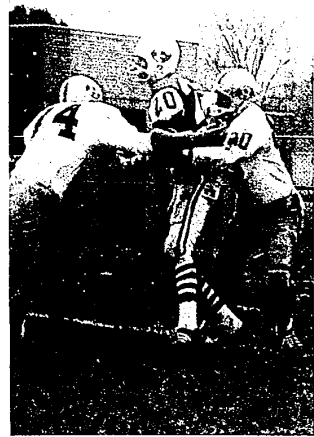
A Rough Day For A Back

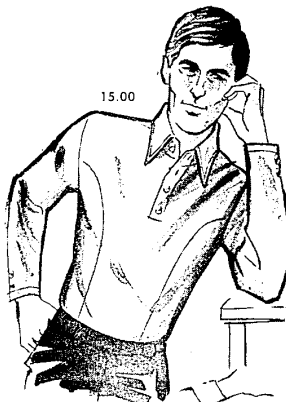


DOWN HE GOES again as a Raider lineman barrels through and nails Dan for a long loss.
