The majority of the children are returned to their natural parents while others are awaiting adoption or placement into a permanent home. Single persons can be foster parents, too. Anyone who wants to be a foster parent must have a good reputation and be financially secure with a stable income source. There is an allowance for the child's care and living expenses but that doesn't leave room for a profit.
