"We plan our schedule week by week, which might mean going to a grocery store, my house for dinner, or a fast food restaurant. The Fizza Hut is Barbara's favorite place. I supplement the care that dhe gets at home by getting her out, exposing her to places she wouldn't otherwise be able to go.

The relationship between the two

women is one of about 24 active matches which the ARC currently fosters in Oakland County. It was initiated, Barbara explained, at her own request.

An unabashed optimist, Barbara said, "I have three brothers; so I decided that it would be nice to have a big sister to go shopping, or bowling, or just have fun."


