Farmington cagers batter North

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One of these days. North Farmington's girls' basketball team is going to catch someone by surprise. And when it does, the Raiders will have their first basketball win in over two years.

North has been improving, little by little, with each game this year. The cagers still don't have anything in the win column to show for it, but they are playing better.

The Raiders were beaten by cross-town rival Farmington 50-27 Thesday. And while the score indicates it was anything but a close contest, one should remember that Farmington rattled Morth 83-26 in their first meeting this season.

"This was not one of our better games." Farmington assistant coach plane Schwartz said after the game. That should serve as notice for the remaining North opponents — one of

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these days, the Raiders are going to ambush somebody. Farmington has been surging lately, too, and the Falcons improvement is registering on the win column. The victory over North was their third in a row and the fourth in five games. Schwartz has been the coach for those five games, taking over for the stilling Bob Lebovish, who was hospitalized for a gall bladder operation three weeks ago. It still hasn't been determined when Lekovish will be able to return.

DESPITE FARMINGTON'S off performance, the Falcons still managed to dominate throughout the contest with North. Guard Sue Carruthers pumped in six of her eight points in the first quarter and the Falcons had 19-5 lead at the end of the period.

North closed the margin slightly, outscoring the taller Falcons 9-7 in the
