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to be active in city government," he says.

He first became interested in Farmington city government after receiving what he believed to be an unsatisfactory answer from the city on a question about his taxes.

A large part of the Volz campaign consists of keeping residents informed.

"I want to keep the people informed on what is going on at all times," he says.

If necessary, Volz has vowed to periodically publish a newsletter for public consumption.

Volz would like to keep a tight rein on city taxes by seeking out waste in city government.

"Some city departments get more than they should," he says.

He noted that the police department could hang on to their cars longer before selling them as an example of a cost saving measure.

Gavel seeks office

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"I'm a Farmington resident and I want to make some policy decisions."

Originally opposed to the Farmington senior citizen housing project, he changed his mind when he learned that first priority occupancy would go to Farmington residents.

Previously a Romulus resident, Gavel says that a negative experience with low-income housing in that community prompted his opposition to such projects.

"I like to see a project with just senior citizens. I'm against low-income housing. It's a real sore spot with me because of my previous experience."

Communication with the public is another concern of the candidate.

Art director visits LIT

Is modern architecture really so "new" or is it the result of traditional concepts and ideas?

Questions like this one will be answered when Arthur Drexler, director of the department of architecture and design at the Museum of Modern Art in New York City, visits Lawrence Institute of Technology (LIT) on Thursday, Nov. 8.

Drexler will speak on "Transformations in Modern Architecture," as part of the School of Architecture's visiting professional lecture series. The presentation will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the architecture auditorium on the LIT campus, 21000 W. Ten Mile Rd., Southfield.

There is no charge and the public is welcome.

As director of the department of architecture and design, Drexler is responsible for selecting works for the collection. The museum is the only place in the world where an international selection of furniture, machine-tooled and hand-crafted useful objects, architectural models, plans and drawings, textiles, posters, and other examples of graphic design is permanently on view.

Hartsock speaks

Hartsock believes one of the biggest problems facing the council is working under the Headlee tax plan.

"A large part of our budget deals with public safety. It is a large fixed expense which is locked in with the union," he says.

The Headlee proposal, says Hartsock, has limited the city in its attempts to maintain services. This year the city was forced to dip into its unappropriated surplus to pay the bills because of the Headlee formula.

Hartsock believes that the combination of his career as a CPA and his experience on the council is an asset to the city.
