Kim Pogue, a Farmington sophomore, was second in the 200-yard freestyle in 2:03.4 and finished 10th in the 100-yard but-

terfly in 1:05.5. Other outstanding Farming-ton performances came from Amy Ed-wards (sixth in the 50 free in 26.3) and Dawn Stanton (sixth in the 100 butterfly in 1:04.4).

FARMINGTON'S RELAYS finished in the top six. The 200 medley relay (Laura Edwards, Angela Gord, Stanton and Marga-ret Richards) linished fifth in 2015. The Falcons' 400 freestyle crew (Schueler, Amy Edwards, Pogue and Richards) also placed fifth in 3:55.6.

Farmington Harrison's best effort came from senior diver Sue Humphries, who fin-ished third with 370.90 points, Harrison's 200 medley relay (Katby Hagan, Julie Weiss, Sharon Goodman and Nikki Allen) finished ninti in 209.3.

"That wasn't my strongest relay — Nan-cy Whittemore was missing — but it was our fastest time of the year in that event," said Harrison coach Todd Knock.

North Farmington had a fine competitor in sophomore Kirsten Kinsman, who fin-ished fourth in the 200 individual medley (2:21.8) and seventh in the 100 backstroke (1:07.2).

Farmington Our Lady of Mercy, one of the strongest girls' swimming teams in the state, didn't enter the county meet. Last Friday, Mercy raised its dual-meet record to 10-0 with a 69-13 victory over Dearborn St. Alphonsis.

Sue Miller was clocked in 2:26.5 to win the IM for Mercy. Some other Mercy firsts: Katle Gibbs (181.35 points in diving), Karen Petersen (1:07.2 in the 100 butterfly) and Ann Colon (2:16.5 in the 200 freestyle).

On Thursday (Nov. 8), Farmington swims at Southfield High, Harrison travels to Livo-nia Churchill and North Farmington moves to Westland John Glenn. All meets begin at 7 p.m.
