12 luxury cars are vandalized in dealer's lot

Two dozen luxury cars at Bob Dusseau Lincoln-Mercury in Farmington were vandalized in two separate incidents last week, resulting in damages and loss in excess of \$10,000.

AM-FM stereos in 1979 models and standard electronic equipment in 1880s, both Lincolns and Mark VI models were the travel of the briders.

1880s, both Lincolns and Mark VI mod-els, were the target of the thefts. The dealership, at 31625 Grand Riv-er, a block west of Orchard Lake Road, was first hit Sunday night. According to Bob Dusseau Sr., three cars were vandafized in the first inci-dent.

He said when that crime was reportdent of Farmington police, the dealership
made a request for increased police
surveillance around the enclosed car
lot until a fence alarm system could be
restored to working order.

The next incident occurred the following night, when 21 cars were vandailized.

"We've had thefts almost every
weekend in our used car lot," Dusseau
claimed. "We've already had \$35,000 in
thefts this year."

Employees of Actron Security Co. of
Detroit were at the dealership Wednesday to repair the faulty alarm system.

Farmington Police Lt. John Santo-mauro said Wednesday the area is "dif-ficult to patrol because it's inaccessi-

ficult to patrol because #15 massaches
ble."

But he said he is satisfied the deadhes
hip was adequately patrolled both
nights.
"We've answered over 300 alarms in
eight years there," Santomauro said.
"That's unheard of.
"I am more than satisfied Dusseau
has received adequate protection."
Santomauro also disputed Dusseau's
claim that the dealership had been the
larget of almost weekly thefts. He said
he had statisfies to disprove that theory.

THERÈ ARE NO suspects in last week's theft. Other police departments have been notified, a standard procedure, according to Farmington police.

"We speculate they were organized when they went in there," Detective Tom Daniels said. "They were probably people from outside the area."

Meanwhile, Farmington police report an increase of malicious destruction of vehicle reports.

"They're hitting sporadically — no particular area." Santomauro said.
"We don't feel the upswing is related to the larcenies from Dusseau's."
