Aardvarks dominate All-Area tennis team with 4 players picked

The Aardvarks of Bloomfield Hills Kingswood dominated the 1979 Observer and Eccentric All-Area Girls' Tennis Team just as they dominated their competition this past season. Kingswood placed four players on the 10-girl squad.

And the Aardvarks were 11-0 in dual competition, winners of the Ann Arbor Invitational, Class C-D regional champions, and Class C-D state champions.

Three of the four Kingswood players named to the all-area team are Class C-D state champions.

Bloomfield Hills Marian was the only other school to place more than one player on the first team with two selections.

Both first and second teams were selected by area tennis coaches.

JANE NEVILLE, Kingswood's No. 1 singles player, led the Aardvark contingent on the all-area team. A junior, Neville had a 9-2 dual meet record. She was runner-up in both the Ann Arbor Invitational and the regional and was a

semi-finalist in the Class C-D state tournament.

Neville was an all-area selection last year as a sophomore.

AMY WALSH had an 11-0 dual match record playing No. 2 singles for Kingswood. She also had a spotless record in tournament play, winning the No. 2 singles in the Ann Arbor Invitational, the regional and the Class C-D state tournament.

Walsh won all of her matches in straight sets. A sophomore, she was a semi-finalist in last year's Class B-C-D state tournament playing No. 1 singles.

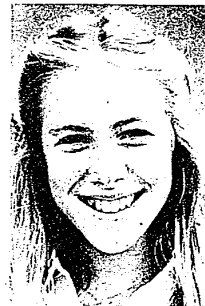
CINDY SMITH, Kingswood's No. 3 singles player, not only had a perfect 9-0 record in dual competition, but she also repeated as state champ in Class C-D.

A sophomore, Smith won the No. 3 singles in both the Ann Arbor Invitational and the regional. She was a 1978 all-area selection.

Hear Joe Granville Give His Predictions Of Where The Market's Going.

Joseph E. Granville is a legend in his own time. In a special "Emergency Letter" of September 23, 1979, Joe Granville called what he felt to be the top of the market for this year. During the next four weeks the market played almost 100 points. He called the entire 1974-76 bull market, catching not only the primary trend but also the intermediate tops and bottoms. He identified the brief November 1977 bulge immediately as a bull trap, and forewarned of a sharp pullback going into the new year of 1978.

He has been right more than most market counselors, but it was his recommendations on gambling stocks that really catapulted Mr. Granville into the limelight. Mr. Granville first recommended the casino and potential casino stocks in March 1978, with the unheard of thesis that gambling will become the biggest new growth industry since electronics and computers.
