All-Area boys' cross country picks sparkle

Bloomfield Hills Labser led the O&E area squads with a sparkling third-place finish in the state meet. For the Knights' extraordinary efforts in that Class A meet, Labser coach Don Rolston has been named O&E coach-of-the-year.

Birmingham Brother Rice was another strong squad, winning the Catholic League, Oakland County and regional meets, before falling to 20th in a disappointing state-meet finish.

Birmingham Groves also had a fine season, battling tooth-and-nail with Labser in the Metro Saburban Association (MSA) before winning the conference meet to earn at the for the league crown.

Not only was the team strength evident in boys' cross, country this year, but the individual standouts were equally impressive.

Three Birmingham harriers, two from Bloomfield Hills and one each from Southfield and Farmington make up the 1979 version of the O&E All-Area boys' cross country team, as selected by the area coaches.

SCOTT HARPER, senior, Birming-ham Seaholm. Considered by many coaches as the top runner the area, Harper was the leader of the Maples squad this season and one of the most

respected runners in the Southeastern Michigan Association. Harper won every dual meet he competed in this fall for coach Ron Wheeler's team. One of his most outstanding accomplishments was a third-place finish in the Class A state meet with a 15:02 clocking at the Howell three-mile ourse. He also placed second in the regional at Royal Oak Kimball.

TIM CANNON, senior, Cranbrook. This Crane standout was second in the

Of the 10 girls selected for the first team, four were from Rochester. They were Karen Curtis, Alimee Landry, Liss Pranseen and Illi Wasbhurn. Washburn was the only senior in the group. Again this year, Rochester's girls were the best in the area. After winning five-straight dual meets, finishing second in the Oaktand Country meet and fourth in the state regional, Rochester landed second behind Brighton in the Class A state meet at Faultwood Shores Golf Course near Brighton.

And once again, Rochester's runners were picked for the All-area team. Curtis, a senior, and juniors Franseen and Landry were named to the first team. Commerson was named Coach of the Year.

Curtis, who captained the Rochester team, finished fifth in the state meet with a time of 17:54.7. She finished third in the Grater Oaktand Abletic League meet and placed fourth in the regional and the county meet.

Franseen, a two-time all-stater, landed sirth in the state meet with a 17:58.4 clocking. She won the GOAL race and placed fifth in the regional. Also a track standout, she made the state meet in the mile and two mile runs.

LANDRY WAS runner up in the GOAL and county meets, but missed the state regional because of illness. "She's an excellent runner," Commer-

Reed's 18:49 was good for 22nd place in the state meet. "She's a good steady runner and she ran a good race at the state meet," said West Bloomfield coach Lee Averill, whose team is a member of the GOAL along with Ro-

chester.

She finished third in that race. She was 20th in the county meet, 22nd in the Royal Oak Kimball regional and 27th in the state meet.
