

Thurston girls conquer Franklin

Redford Thurston, who scored twice over Linnea Franklin during the regular girls' basketball season, made it three in a row Monday in the state tournament.

The Eagles struggled to a 38-30 win in the Class A District at Redford Union.

It was a defensive tussle right from the opening tipoff in a battle between two of the taller teams in the area. Franklin led 8-4 after the first quarter,

but Thurston held the upper hand 14-12 at the half. The score was tied at 25 after three periods.

Jean Rowley led the Eagles with 11 points. Barb Beebe contributed 10 and Theresa Moran eight. Julie Wilga and Anna Collins totaled eight and seven points, respectively, for the Patriots.

"It was a very slow-moving game. They were awful big and we were looking for the good shot," explained Thurston coach George Heger. "They (Patri-

ots) played a good box-and-one defense and I was playing with a sprained ankle.

"I was expecting a close game. We didn't try to run the fast break because we knew we would only get one shot," said Heger. "We spread out in the last quarter and were getting fouled. We made seven free throws to break away."

Beebe snared 19 rebounds during the game, and Rowley grabbed 12.

Franklin coach Chuck Hebestreit, though disappointed with the loss, was pleased with the success of the team throughout the season.

"At our end, we were going to slow it down. We didn't want to run with them, and we had trouble getting the ball inside," said Hebestreit. "Rowley, I felt was held intact. Beebe, I think, came through in the clutch."

"Again, we were concentrating on keeping them away from the basket. Both teams, I think, were holding on to the ball a little longer looking for the good shot," said Hebestreit.

"We were quite pleased. All of the girls will be back who were in at the end. This is the first time that Franklin has ever been 500 or better in girls' basketball," Hebestreit added.

The Patriots finished with a 10-10 mark.

Ladywood downs Divine Child

Ladywood overcame a first-quarter deficit to grab a tough 54-45 decision over Dearborn Divine Child Tuesday in first round girls' basketball district action at Madonna College.

The Blazers move on to the district Class B semifinals against Detroit Immaculata at 8 p.m. Thursday. The championship will be played Saturday at 7:30 p.m.

Carolyn Prebenda came off the bench and was the key, scoring 17 points to lead the way for Ladywood. "She definitely had the best game of her career," said coach Ed Kavanaugh.

The senior forward also had 14 rebounds.

"They (Divine Child) were up for the game," said Kavanaugh. "This was our third time around, and I don't like playing teams three times."

"It was all tied up just before half-time, then Ronna Greenberg stole the ball, fed Liz O'Brien and she hit one from half court. That kind of picked us up, and the third quarter was a big one for us. We outscored them 12-7 and opened it up a little bit."

Leslie Nadeau helped the Ladywood cause with 14 points and 19 rebounds

before fouling out. Liz O'Brien had 11 points, 13 rebounds and four assists. Aggie Conti had eight points and five assists.

DC's Andi Fron led all scorers with 20 points.

Ladywood pushed its overall record to 17-4 with the win.

CITY OF FARMINGTON COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS (Summary)

A Regular Meeting of the Farmington City Council was held November 19, 1979 in the Council Chambers, 23600 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan. Mayor Richard L. Tupper called the meeting to order at 8:00 p.m. City Clerk Viane administered the Oath of Office to newly elected Councilmen William S. Hartsock, Ralph D. Yoder and Warren A. Buckler, Jr.

City Manager Deadman was appointed temporary chairman for the election of Mayor and Mayor Pro Tem.

WILLIAM S. HARTSOCK was elected Mayor by members of the Council.

ALTON L. BENNETT was elected Mayor Pro Tem by members of the council.

Minutes of the previous meeting were approved. Minutes of other boards were received and/or filed.

The Public Hearing on a proposed amendment to the Zoning Ordinance was tabled.

Council received and filed a letter from the Rouge River Watershed Council regarding Seattle Bill 1.

Council received and filed a report from the City Canvassing Board and the Election Commission regarding results of the November 6, 1979 City Election.

Permission was granted to Hi-Pro Systems to display an exhibit in the City Hall depicting the sewage problem and its effect on the environment.

The following resolutions were adopted:

Consenting to the transfer of employment of the Willow Run Rubber and Lining Company from Farmington to Bay City.

Authorizing third estimated payment to the Morrison Company, in the amount of \$91,733.49 for work completed in the 1979 Road Construction Program.

Accepting the bid of Roger Penske Chevrolet for three police vehicles.

Approving Deferment of Special Assessment Payment on Parcel No. 23-25-355-031.

Establishing procedure for approval of budget requests and interim budget increases of agencies which are funded jointly by the City of Farmington and the City of Farmington Hills.

Ordinance No. C-456-79 which would increase the city's water and sewer rates was introduced.

The following ordinances were adopted:

ORDINANCE NO. C-454-79

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CODE OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON BY ADDING A NEW CHAPTER, WHICH NEW CHAPTER SHALL BE DESIGNATED AS CHAPTER 4 OF TITLE 1 OF SAID CODE.

An Ordinance to provide that the tax exemption for housing financed by Federally aided or State Housing Development Authority aided mortgages or Advances or Grants from said Authority, as established by Michigan Public Act 346 of 1966, as amended, shall not apply to all said housing within the City of Farmington.

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:

Section 1:

That the tax exemption established by Sub-section (1) of Section 15a of Michigan Public Act 346 of 1966, as amended, for housing projects financed with federally aided mortgages as defined in said Act, and for housing projects financed with mortgages aided by the State Housing Development Authority, or an advance or grant from said State Housing Development Authority, shall not apply to all said housing projects within the boundaries of the City of Farmington.

Section 2:

That this ordinance is adopted by authority of Subsection (2) of Section 15a of Michigan Public Act 346 of 1966, as amended.

Section 3:

That any ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

This ordinance was introduced at a regular meeting of the Farmington City Council on November 5, 1979, was adopted and enacted at the next regular meeting of the City Council on November 19, 1979, and will become effective ten days after publication.

ORDINANCE NO. C-455-79

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 96, DISORDERLY CONDUCT, SECTION 9.155, MINORS, ALCOHOLIC LIQUOR, AND CHAPTER 1, ADOPTION, CONTENTS AND INTERPRETATIONS, SECTION 1.12, PENALTY, OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON.

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:

CHAPTER 96, Section 9.155 MINORS; Alcoholic Liquor

No person under the age of twenty-one (21) years shall, in the City, do any of the following:

- (1) Purchase, offer, or attempt to purchase, have in his possession or consume any alcoholic beverage in a licensed premise. A person who violates this subsection is liable for a civil infraction.
- (2) Furnish any false information or make any false representation as to his age to any law enforcement officer, or to any person in charge of or employed in an establishment licensed to sell alcoholic beverages, for the purpose of obtaining a sale of any alcoholic beverage to himself.
- (3) Knowingly possess, transport or have under his control in any motor vehicle any alcoholic beverage unless that person is employed by a licensee under the Michigan Liquor Control Act and is possessing, transporting or having such alcoholic beverage in a motor vehicle under his control during regular working hours and in the course of his employment.
- (4) It shall be unlawful for any person to sell, assist in the procurement of, provide, give or furnish to any minor under the age of twenty-one (21), any alcoholic beverage, except upon authority of and pursuant to a prescription of a duly licensed physician.

CHAPTER 1, Section 1.12 Penalty

Unless another penalty is expressly provided by this Code for any particular provision or section, every person convicted of a violation of any provision of this Code or any rule or regulation adopted or issued in pursuance thereof, shall be punished by a fine of not more than five hundred (\$500.00) dollars and costs of prosecution or by imprisonment for not more than ninety (90) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment. Any person convicted of a civil infraction for a violation of any provision of this Code shall be fined not more than five hundred (\$500.00) dollars. Each act of violation and every day upon which any such violation shall occur shall constitute a separate offense. The penalty provided by this section, unless another penalty is expressly provided, shall apply to the amendment of any section of this Code whether or not such penalty is re-enacted in the amendatory ordinance. The provisions of this section shall apply to violations of the Uniform Traffic Code adopted in Chapter 105. This ordinance is declared to be an emergency ordinance which is immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety.

This ordinance was introduced, adopted and enacted at a regular meeting of the Farmington City Council of November 19, 1979 and will become effective immediately. Council approved the monthly bills for payment. The meeting was adjourned at 9:25 p.m.

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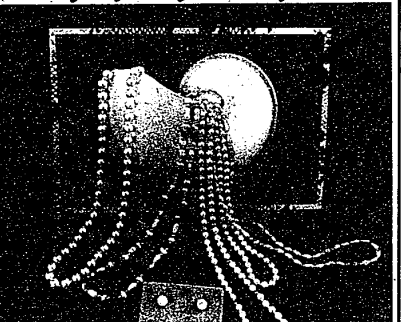

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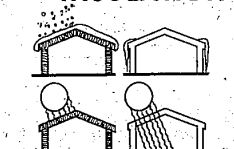
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
