



"Small Wonders," a holiday show of miniature masterpieces by 24 Michgan painters, printers, sculptors and ceramists, is on display now in Garret Gallery, 33310 Grand River.
This is the third show of small works of art staged by the 12 members of the cooperative gallery who have invited. 12 other artists to join in displaying works no larger than 10 by 10 inches.
Former shows have been popular because of the quality of the art as well as the affordable prices. All pieces are priced under \$100.
The Garret is a unique walk-up gallery, operating in downtown Farmington since 1975, where the artist-owners invite visitors into their studios which
