## Afraid To Start Work? This Is Normal Reaction

Maybe you'd like to go back to the business world now that your children are grown, but are afraid of what you'll find there.

So, it might help to know that you aren't alone.

More than 100 women attended a seminar on "Second Careers" at Schoolcraft College Tuesday and almost everyone admitted to that sort of feelings.

In fact, the ladies heard a panel discussion by three women who have returned to the business world. The panel members, who are all employed by the Kelly Girl Temporary Help Agency and had never met each other before, all said that they were scared the first time they went out on a job.

PANEL MEMBERS were Anne Monforton of Redford Township, Donna Mueller of Livonia, and Josephine Bonamy of Detroit. Mrs. Monforton and Mrs. Mueller returned to work when their children were in school and both had had previous office experience before raising a family.

Mrs. Bonamy, a widow, had had no previous office experience and told the audience that she did not hold a high school diploma. "My first job was counting nails at the Bullder's Shop," she said.

According to Robert Seelye of the Kelly Girls organization, doubts about returning to work are not unusual. In fact, Seelye said, recruiting is the biggest problem faced by his company.

"We are going to start holding recruiting parties similar to the Tupperware evenings in an effort to convince these women that they can come back to work," he said.

LUCILLE CARPENTER of Livonia, who was attending the seminar, said "It's enlightening to find that other people are a little hesitant to return to work. I thought I was the only person who felt funny and afraid about the idea."

Mrs. Carpenter, who brought her sister-in-law, Mrs. Sarah Scardner of Dearborn, to the seminar, said she was thinking about going back to work when she read about the seminar in the Observer and decided to

attended. "I'm enthusiastic about the idea of working," she concluded.

Reactions of other women in attendance were similar. Donna Bush of Farmington said she was thinking about returning to work and the conference had given her some ideas and leads. Her sister, Betty Leeds of Livonia, said that she currently has a part-time job, but was thinking about doing something different. She also came looking for ideas.

JUDY GEORGE of Plymouth agreed. "I'm thinking about going back to work now that my children are older and this program has given me things to think about," she explained. Mrs. Bonamy Chisholm of Livonia said that she had worked in an office for 20 years, but was thinking about going back to work. That's why she decided to attend the seminar after reading the Observer story on the program.

Gerry Hiving of Westland said that she learned some things that would apply not only to her planned return to the office, but for her teenage daughter as well.

During the morning session the ladies heard an outline of positions available for women in industries, hospitals and the temporary help field.

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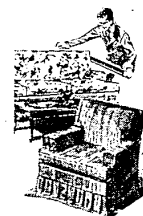
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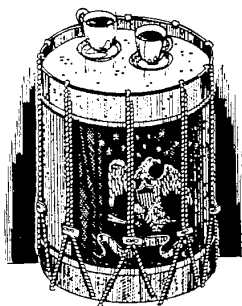
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
