Now And Future Board Evaluates Need For Schools

Farmington administrators and Board of Education are taking a long, hard look at the immediate and long-range needs for school buildings with growth in enrollment as projected plus a minimum of space for staff services and special programs now in existence.

If such a decision should be made, instructional media centers similar to the one recently completed at William Grace could be incorporated at the same time. Another facet of the building proposal which is under close scrutiny is the study of new construction methods which can stretch the bond issue dollars to their greatest possible potential.

Assign FHS Grad

FARMINGTON Airman I/C Richard B. Curtis, a 1967 graduate of Farmington High School, has graduated at Keesler Air Force Base, Miss. from the U.S. Air Force radio repairman course. He has been assigned to Loring Air Force Base, Maine, for duty with the Strategic Air Command.

Twenty Acres has been purchased at Northwestern Highway and Middle Belt for a fifth junior high school, now in the planning stages.

The board must decide on where to expand facilities for elementary pupils. Projected figures based on enrollment over the past five years indicate an increase in their number during the next five year period.

Locations of portable classrooms now in use indicate where school population is most densely concentrated. Presently there are six at Shawassee, two at Middle Belt, two at Larkshire, and one at Highmeadow.

Since the 1967 bond proposal made provision for either elementary buildings and/or additions to existing schools as decided by the board, various alternatives may be considered.

Because Wood Creek School, the district's 11th elementary structure, was built as part of the proposal, what should be next on the building agenda?

IF ANOTHER new school were to be the answer, it should be built, according to projected enrollments, in Sections 20, 31, or 6, probably in that order of priority. This solution would relieve conditions at Longacre, but neither Shawassee nor Larkshire would benefit.

A school in section 25 could offer the necessary relief to Shawassee and Larkshire. Only if attendance area philosophy were altered significantly. Of itself, area 25 does not contain enough residents to merit placement of a school there at this time.

Another possibility is to make additions at each of three schools which are presently overcrowded -- Shawassee, Larkshire, and Longacre. Enrollment projections through 1973 foresee a need for
