Class begins for gardeners

Yard and garden horticulturalists who are enthusiastic about helping others with their gardens are invited to become master gardeners, in sessions sponsored by Michigan State University's Cooperative Extension Service.

The university's horticulture depart-

ment offers 30 hours of training on a wide array of horticultural topics. In turn, the participants agree to provide 20 hours of volunteer service in educational activities.

The master gardener uses knowledge learned in class to help neighbors, community groups and clubs.

In the past, master gardeners have staffed plant clinics, written newsletters, given how-to talks, and answered gardening questions via the telephone in the Cooperative Extension Service office.

Classes in Oakland County will start on Feb. 6 and conclude April 9. There will be one class a week, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. The cost of \$20 includes materials.
