## Bette hits highs but no low points playing 'The Rose'

Always living at extremes, hurling out a credo of "drugs, sex and rock "n roll" to a frended audience, Bette Midler plays "The Rose" (R), a rock superstar of the '6ts.
Rose's life and character are lossely based on the career of white superstar Janis Joglini who overdosed on heroin at the age of 27. Midler's vocal range and style don't compare with Joglin's, nevertheless, she belts out rock and blues in a splashy, gut-wrenching performance that marks a sensational movie debut. Midler carries the film. The music, unfortunately, is not always up to the fewered pitch of the performer. Some of the compositions have a disco sound that hardly smacks of the '69s. Midler manages to overcome this handicap. She holds back nothing in communicating the physically demanding, emotionally punishing, flat-out efforts of the hyped-up rock star.
On stage, Rose's gyrations create an interaction with her concert audience that has the frightening aspect of a sacrificial ritual.

HER PRIVATE LIFE is keyed in the same kind of desperate titch. When she is not screaming lyrics, she is screaming in rage or tears or in one of her out-of-control states induced by booze or

There is little relief from the crescendo pitch the film maintains; there are few contrasting moments or changes of pace. Cars, planes, voices are always screeching.
