Robert Scott, museum shops manager, says this year's gift suggestions are as exciting as any previous holiday season.

Contemporary ceramics in sizes to fit your decorative needs are imported from Peru. The ceramic pieces have a white slip over terra cotta as a back-

ground to the bold black line themes. The motifs are distinctively Amazonian. Decorated fabrics are available too. There are also a variety of gift selections available. U.S. made one-of-a-kind glass paperweights are just one such example. They are unique in design and appearance.

Michigan craftsmen also contribute to the gift ideas. George Lindino's wooden toys are sure to please children of all ages. And, jewelry created by Roz Balkan and Kerry McBride provide fashionable gift selections.

Books on just about every topic in the arts are now on sale in the institute's gift shop. The recently published "Alex Katz," by Irving Sandler is a popular gift idea, especially since 20 of the books were recently autographed by Katz.

Among all the holiday suggestions, you will also discover a just released four-color gift catalog, "Pocket-logue," which will help solve your gift giving year-round. This new catalog is a Founders Society project.
