# Forced overtime doesn't pay off

overtime rather than hiring new work-ers may find the move cheaper only if the overtime workers want the extra hours and are productive during the ex-tra time.

a time. Robert W. Hollmann, a management Robert W. Hollmann, a management consultant and professor at the University of Arizona, surveyed members of a scientific research organization and reviewed other research findings. He concludes that it is important for firms to consider employee preferences and willingness to work overtime.

Writing in the summer issue of Human Resource Management, published by the UM Graduate School of Business Administration, Prof. Hollmann presents these major findings in his study.

\*\*The higher an employee 5 job satisfaction, the more willing he or she is to work overtime.

• The greater an employee's identification with the organization, the more willing he or she is to work overtime.

• The greater an employee's perception of the fairness of the rewards

received for overtime work, the more willing he or she is to work overtime.

"THESE FINDINGS can be com-bined to suggest that the individual more willing to work overtime is the

one who has high job satisfaction, identifies strongly with the organization, believes the overtime is necessary to get the job done, and feels that he or she receives equitable rewards for the overtime work performed," says Hallmann, overtime Hollmann.

"It is important to note that the fac-tors relevant to overtime willingness are not personal factors but rather jobrganization-related or overtime-re-lated factors.

"Thus, while a manager should not ignore the personal needs of workers in making overtime decisions, too much attention to these at the neglect of joborganization-related and overtime-related factors could be detrimental to the overtime effort."

It is important to make sound evaluations of an organization's overtime situation, Hollmann explains, because "if imprudent overtime decisions and assignments are made, the savings may be considerably less than antici-

pated. Or even worse, the poor over-time decision may be reflected in less-han-anticipated quantity of output, poor quality, increased waste and even damage, and deteriorating morale — the combination thereof resulting in overall costs greater than if the organi-zation had hired new workers.
