## Wetlands protection bill passes

Environmentalists have scored a vic-tory with approval of a bill which pro-tects Michigan's wetlands from com-

tects Michigan's wetlands from com-mercial development.
Farmington's state legislators in Lansing, Sen. Doug Ross, D-Oak Park, and Rep. Sandy Brotherton, R-Farm-ington, threw early support to the mea-sure.
"I am satisfied that this bill will pro-wide Michigan of them control to the in-

ride Michigan citizens and the important Wetlands of the state the type of protection that neither environmental-

ists nor many accelopers can complain about." Brotherton said.

The legislation takes effect Oct. 1, 1980. It authorizes the Department of Natural Resources to conduct an inven-tory of all wetlands in counties with fewer than 100,000 residents to determine which areas need protection

The measure restricts development or draining of swamps, marshes, bogs or other wetlands over five acres which

are adjacent to lakes, streams or one of the Great Lakes.

Ross was not available for comment Friday, but his Senate aide, Bob O'Leary, called the legislation a strong environmental bill.

"As it stand, it provides for substantial protection in counties over 100,000 residents where loss of wellands is most critical," O'Leary said. will issue a permit only if there is "no feasible or prudent" alternative. If a landowner appeals a DNR decision and a court rules in his or her factor, the DNR must pay for loss of property- or amend the ruling to permit greater land use.

"It's a way of giving the landowner some relief," Brotherton said.

"There's got to be an appeal process."

Agricultural activity is also protected under the legislation. Almost all agricultural activity is exempt from the regulations spelled out in the bill.

"Farmers are having enough trouble trying to make a living for their families these days," Brotherton said.

"They don't need more rules from Lansing telling them what to do with their property."

Wetlands absorb water to prevent flooding and provide a natural habitat for wildlife.


