

More accepting seen for '80s

Energy forecast institute topic

The Jewish Welfare Federation women's division will take a close look at the energy situation at its 33rd annual Institute, scheduled 9:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. Wednesday, Jan. 16, in the Jewish Community Center, West Bloomfield.

Titled "Eye on the '80s," the program will present an economic and political forecast for the coming decade, with particular emphasis on the energy situation.

Guest speakers will be Elihu Bergman, executive director of Americans for Energy Independence, and Helen Junz, vice president of the First National Bank of Chicago and former deputy assistant secretary of the treasury in the area of natural resources.

Bergman, former assistant director of the Harvard Center for Population Studies, heads a national public interest coalition which is based in Washington. Ms. Junz also has worked as a senior staff economist for the Council of Economic Advisors.

The institute will begin with an Israeli-style breakfast. It is open to all women interested, and reservations should be made with the women's division office, 965-3939.

Doris August of Birmingham is institute chairman. Working with her are Judy Narens of Huntington Woods, associate chairman, Esther Jones of Franklin, program chairman and Beatrice Rowe of Southfield, advisor.

It seems everyone with an audience is offering opinions about the new decade. I want to share in the risk and fun. A favorite method is to recall major events and forecast next steps.

We remember the '60s as issue-oriented times. Civil rights for minorities spilled into political rights for draftees. We grew remarkably in our capacity to be responsible for human rights. At the same time, we knew tension and discomfort as we divided into hostile camps. Scars remain, but we are a better people. For example, simplistic patriotism confronting questioning patriotism nudged most of us into more thoughtful allegiance.

Critics call the '70s a time of excessive concern with ourselves. Experimental religious movements were popular and traditional religion turned to the inner life. Men's facial hair and women's skirts went up and down as mirrors of our vanity. Personal concern gave birth to one-issue groups dominating politics and ideology.

A POSITIVE VIEW of the '70s claims the personal focus is a step of advancement on the growth of the '60s. Many of us see the validity of self-expression by people who previously felt silenced. We appreciate freedom for special groups and have more capacity to applaud freedoms we do not wish for ourselves. More of us know that stifling one expression limits all freedom.

Together, these decades have widened our horizons. There is a common thread running through the last 20 years. An struggle for freedom must include new openings for more than the specific oppressed group, or it will not last. New opportunities in one area becomes liberating for many people.

My hunch about the '80s is that issue-orientation and personal focus will grow into stronger communities where divergence is welcome. We will be less quick to judge and denounce. We will be more reflective and searching. We will accept more people whose views or styles we do not want to adopt for ourselves. We will be more inclusive.

The events in the Middle-East in the closing weeks of the '70s will send us into the new decade with better patience. Our feeling of helplessness will pull us into better understanding of the limitations of power.

Loyalty will become deeper and broader. We will be more proud but less provincial. We will be more committed to purposes we feel important. Narrow and limiting devotion will be broken open by expanded involvement in wider concerns.

NEARLY 20 YEARS ago we saw the first major church council, Vatican II, which did not denounce but affirmed. All through society we have been learning to be for something without degrading those who see things differently.

In these years the space program has given a vivid sense of our beautiful blue planet. Environmental concerns have heightened our awareness that we are all one family. We expect a tighter economy. But the '80s need not feel restrictive.

A new burst of esthetics can help us with hopes too big for logic. We need to see our beautiful planet as a vision of home. We need a totally inclusive sense of human community. Artists can help us move beyond applauding rights and supporting freedom. The '80s challenge us to responsible enjoyment of ecology. All we really have, in physical and human facts, is one world.
