

Prep volleyball preview

FHS spikers sting rival

Farmington's volleyball team lived up to coach Ron Shortt's expectations by opening the season with victories Farmington Harrison and North Farmington in the city tournament Monday.

The Falcons and North met in the finals

The Falcons and North met in the finals and the Raiders held an early advantage by winning the first game in the best-of-three match, 15-11. Farmington rallied, however, to edge North in the second game, 15-13, and swept to the tournament championship with a 15-7 victory in the decisive third game.

"We relied heavily on our bench and they did a super job for us." Shortt said.
North advanced to the finals by whipping Harrison in straight games, 15-3 and 15-6. The Hawks took Farmington the full three games before falling to the Falcons. Harrison won the first, 15-10, but Farmington won the next two, 15-9 and 15-8.

Short is looking for big things from his Falcons this season. Now in his fourth year at the helm (and the only volleyball coach

Farmington has ever had), Shortt has watched his team improve every year. He sees this year's squad as the best yet. "We've gotten better every year," Shortt said. "We were tied for third in the ILL (inter-Lakes League) last year and were fifth two years ago. We hope to be better this year. "This is the best group I've ever had. I can't really tell how good they are, not until we get into the heat of competition."
