Every credit card purchase, say the CPAs, should be approached as if it was a cash purchase. By asking yourself whether the item is really needed, wanted and affordable before charging, may help save the family budget from financial chaos and paying finance charges later.

The best way to avoid finance charges is also to decide ahead of time on credit card purchases. By determining at the beginning of each month the maximum total of charges that can be repayed easily, you will have the con-

enience of charging with

venience of charging without the penan-ties that mismanagement brings.
Keeping all receipts until the billing statement arrives and then checking your spending against the statement will help prevent possible errors. These can occur frequently, too, if for no other reason than a sales clerk's illegi-ble handwriting.

If any card is missing, notify the issuer imme-diately. While there is a \$50 limit to your liability in case it is stolen or lost, it applies to each card you own.
