An all-new futuristic display will greet visitors to the Oldsmobile area at the auto show. A Delta Royale coupe, a 1980 Cutlass Brougham sedan and Toronado diesel will rotate on turntables in the area.

The Delta Royale coupe is medium camel metallic with a camel tan interior. Like other 1980 Oldsmobile Delta 88s, the featured car has a lengthened front end and shortened rear. Park and turn lamps are in the bumper and allow a lower front end for reduced aerodynamic drag.

The featured Cutlass sedan is black with a camel tan interior. The model is one of three new notchback sedans to join the Cutlass lineup for 1980. The display car

features optional opera lamps, available for the first time on 1980 Cutlasses.

A third turntable car is the fuel-efficient diesel-powered Oldsmobile Toronado. The featured model is light gray with claret leather interior and an electric astroroof.

The 1980 Toronado has shed up to an additional 111 pounds over the redesigned 1979 Toronado to help improve fuel economy.

A diesel engine cutaway is also on display at the show. The engine, with moving parts, provides visitors to the division's display a look inside this power plant.
