

# Raider tankers top Farmington

Three North Farmington swimmers won two events each Thursday as the Raiders bested Farmington High, 104-67, in a non-league meet in North's pool.

Phil Holcomb won the 200-yard freestyle (1:55.6) and the 500-yard freestyle (5:18.9). Jim Gasser won the 200 individual medley (2:13.8) and the 100 breaststroke (1:06.2). Kirk Knock won the 100 butterfly (1:01.1) and the 100 backstroke (1:03.1).

North Farmington won 10 of the 11 events, including the 400 freestyle relay (Holcomb, Scott Moore, Carl Gunderson and Brian Mandelfield), which was timed in 3:40.1. Farmington's Doug Antishin won the 50-yard freestyle with a time of 25.1.

With the victory North has a 1-2 overall record.

In another swimming meet Thursday, Northville High downed Farmington Harrison, 54-26, in the Western Six League.

North Rudel, a Harrison senior, set Northville pool records in the 200-yard freestyle (1:48.2) and the 500 freestyle (4:51.1). Teammate Al Babcock won the 100 backstroke in 1:02.1.

Harrison dropped to 0-2 overall and 0-1 in the WSL.

On Tuesday (Jan. 15), North Farmington enters the Dean Edell Ford (Jan. 17). North hosts Bloomfield Hills Lahser and Harrison is home to Plymouth Canton. All meets begin at 7:30 p.m.

# Falcon matmen win

Farmington's wrestlers swept 10 of 13 matches, winning five on falls, to whip Milford Lakeland, 52-14, in a dual meet Wednesday at Farmington.

The victory improved the Falcons' record to 9-4 overall and 2-0 in the Inter Lakes League (ILL). John Murphy (121-pound weight class) and Gregg Lemanski (187) upped their match marks to 15-1 with wins against Lakeland.

Murphy's win got Farmington on track after Lakeland had won two of the first three matches on pins. Murphy outscored Lakeland's Chris Haikie, 6-1, and the Falcons did not lose another match.

Winners on pins for Farmington were Dave Denny (105), who pinned Brad Hewitt in 1:43; Bill Anglin (132), a winner over Roy Coates in 4:51; Mark Bartram (147), over Dave Need in 1:38; Teddy Moore (155) in 5:55 against Jerry Richardson; and Dave Schultz (198) against Steve Merkle in 5:24.

Other winners for Farmington included Jim Molney (140) over Robin Flores, 11-4; Jim Steiner (169), 19-6 against Tom Lincoln; Lemanski by a 10-2 margin over Ron Fredericks; and Doug Peeling (heavyweight) in a 17-2 decision against Rich Fulmer.

# Brother Rice overcomes CC

It wasn't a champagne celebration. But the water bottles were emptied - over each others' heads - when Birmingham Brother Rice basketball players finished upending No. 1 state-ranked Detroit Catholic Central, 56-53.

The Raiders prevailed in the classic Central Division battle which proved to have all the emotional impact of this great rivalry.

But, more importantly for coach Bill Norton's Warriors, this Friday home victory, the fifth straight since Rice lost its first two games of the season, gave the Birmingham squad recognition among the state's elite.

"Obviously, we were very geared up to play this game," said Norton, who felt his squad's victory was not an upset. "The students didn't feel we could win the game, but the team did."

Norton hasn't gone undefeated in the Central Division in his 16 years at Brother Rice. So, while he was elated with the victory, he warned his team after the game not to be overconfident and stressed the need for improvement.

"Bishop Borgess isn't going to lay down just because we beat Catholic Central tonight," the Rice coach said of his Tuesday night opponent. "I don't feel we played particularly well, but we were tough."

"We played with guts - with a lot of heart. We played hard, but we didn't play smart."

"I really feel we are going to get a lot better," the Rice coach added. "Like I told the boys, he have to learn to play smarter."

RICE OWNED A 48-39 lead going into the final quarter before coach Brennan hit one free throw, and teammate Judd Hart then drew an offensive foul on Shamrock All-State candidate Barry Spencer on the return trip downcourt. Hart calmly sank both foul shots with only eight seconds left for the three-point victory.

CC, now 5-2 overall, was led by Spencer's 19 points. Spencer, standing 6-foot-6, hit on six of eight from the floor in the first half, but only two of seven in the second half. Much of the success in stopping Spencer went to Rice's Rob Manilla, who not only scored 15 points himself, but held Spencer to only 15 shots.

"This is our seventh game and this is the first time he's (Manilla's) been healthy, and so he played good defense ... he had to guard a guy three of four inches taller," Norton said.

Rice's Brennan added 13 points and six assists and sophomore Paul Jokisch netted 10. Hart added 11 rebounds and four assists. Rice outscored CC, 22-20.

Wendt added 18 points for the Shamrocks.

The Warriors held the upper hand most of the game, leading 16-15 after the first quarter and 34-29 at halftime.

# Farmington, North log volleyball wins

In other volleyball action, North Farmington surprised Westland John Glenn by sweeping two straight games, 15-8 and 15-11, in the Northwest Suburban League (NSL) opener for both last Thursday at North.

The Raiders trailed, 8-5, in the second contest when Karen Kozicki took over the serve for North. She successfully served for eight straight points, giving North a commanding 13-8 lead.

"They (Glenn) couldn't set up their offense (during Kozicki's serve)," Raider coach Sandy Lubienicki said. "They sent back free balls, and that let us set up our attack."

"We played well, both offensively and defensively. Anything they spiked at us we set up and spiked right back."

North got outstanding play from co-captains Nancy Hughes and Lori Minzloff. Hughes was probably the strongest player on the court - she led offensively. Lubienicki said.

Minzloff served up six aces and converted 18 of 24 spikes during the two games.

Glenn was the preseason league favorite by most conference coaches. Redford Tuxton, another highly-touted squad and a conference title favorite, is North's next opponent Wednesday at 7 p.m. The contest will be played at Thurston.

On Thursday, North (2-1 on the season) will host Garden City East, last year's NSL co-champ. Game time is 7 p.m.

Farmington claimed its third straight volleyball victory in easy fashion last Wednesday, taking two straight games against Milford Lakeland, 15-2 and 15-4, at Lakeland.

Lisa King and Julie Tadrzynski sparked the Falcon win. King served four aces (unreturned serves) and Tadrzynski slammed home seven of eight spikes.

"It (the match) went pretty fast," Farmington coach Ron Shortt said. "We didn't miss too many."

"The girls were serving a lot of aces and we just put them (Lakeland) away. They really didn't have much of a chance."

The victory was the first for Farmington in the Inter Lakes League. The Falcons host Pontiac Northern Monday at 7 p.m. All Farmington home matches are played at the Farmington Training Center gymnasium.
