Ten roller rinks located in Wayne, Oakland, Macomb and Monroe counties will participate in the event Saturday and Sunday, Jan. 26-27.

In this area, skaters who want to join the battle against diabetes, will be skating in Bonaventure Rink, 24505 Halstead in Farmington Hills, and in Riverside Arena, 36635 Plymouth, in Livonia.

The skate-a-thon in Bonaventure runs from 1 to 6:30 p.m. Sunday. The skate-a-thon in Riverside Arena runs from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Sunday.

Almond hopes to top the \$24,102 raised last year by 1,309 skaters.

Symphony quintet makes debut

The Detroit Symphony Woodwind Quintet makes its debut appearance on the Detroit Chamber Works series at 8 p.m. Friday, Jan. 25 in Orchestra Hall.

The quintet will perform music of Franz Danzi, Igor Stravinsky, Ferenc Farkas, and Harold Laudenslager in the second concert 1979-80 season.

The concert will open with Danzi's Quintet in D minor, Stravinsky's "Pastorale" as arranged by the composer for wind quintet, and Farkas' Laudenslager's Wind Quintet, Opus 16, composed in 1962. The Laudenslager work was last performed in Detroit in 1973 during the premiere season of the series, then just established to honor the memory of the Detroit composer.

Following the concert the audience is

invited to meet informally with the artists over refreshments in the Orchestra Hall lounge.

MEMBERS OF THE Quintet are the five first-chair wind players of the Detroit Symphony: Ervin Monroe, flute; Donald Baker, oboe; Paul Schaller, clarinet; Robert Williams, bassoon; and Eugene Wads, horn. The group has just released its first recording, on the Coronet label, which includes the Stravinsky and Farkas works which they will perform at Friday evening's concert.

This recital by the Detroit Symphony Woodwind Quintet is co-sponsored by Detroit Chamber Works and the Friends of WDET-FM.
