by individuals or religious organizations. LOCALLY, THE PROJECT contacted "every church in Michigan," Mrs. Greenberg describes. The response was all but unanimous. In the immediate area, religious organizations from Garden City to Rochester responded with contributions of money, clothing and supplies for distribution within Cambodia, providing relief at refugee centers in Thailand or to settle and maintain refugee families in the United States.
