Invasion boosts gold, defense

The stock market has opened the new decade with a bang. Stimulated by the Russian invasion of Afghanistan and subsequent countermeasures announced by the White House, stock prices have virtually exploded on the up-side, accompanied with extremely heavy trading volume. The change of interest from one group of stocks to another has happened so swittly that at times it has been difficult to keep up with it all.

FIRST, ON the heels of the invasion, oil stocks began to show signs of weak-ening. This group had led the market during most of 1979. They all had advanced substantially and were subject

zinc. Companies which mine those met-als drew center stage attention.

THE MARKET was a bit slow to recognize the most obvious immediate effect in this country from the Russianation — the scrapping of SaLT II.

Once the market recognized this, the defense issues quickly dominated trading. The aerospace industry is highly dependent upon the defense budget of the country.
