Sholem Aleichem show will feature 2,500 works

Visitors can preview more than 2,500 works from 125 of Michigan's top professional artists at the 17th annual Sholem Aleichem Institute Art Show and Sale Feb. 8-10 at Shenandoah Country Club in West Bloomfield.

Painting, watercolors, etchings, wood carvings, stained glass works, silk screen, sculpture, batiks, macrame, ceramics and jewelry will be on sale.

Such artists as William Allen, Daniel Cote, Donna Beaubien, Ralph Davis, Ingrid Hofer and Ron Lieberman will be on exhibit.

On Friday, Feb. 8, from 8 to 10 p.m. it's "Sip and Shop" time. Saturday eve-

ning, Feb. 9, at 6 p.m. "A Happening," with original art prizes awarded to guests will take place.

His forte is creating meatless menus

Erwin Wagner's creative combinations of foods has prompted his admirers to comment that "he goes beyond the sound barrier," and "has written a new language in food preparation."

His work is now on display during a new class called "Creative Meatless Menus" Mondays from 7:30-9:30 p.m. in Farmington Community Center. The meetings run through Feb. 25 and students may join at any time.

Guests will share Wagner's expertise in learning to prepare soups, salads, entrees and desserts. One of his recipes is an ice-cream concoction made from fruits.

Wagner gives monthly buffet dinners in Ferndale Community Center made of his original dishes that include fruits, vegetables, seeds, nuts and cheese, with maybe an occasional spice added for flavor.

The dinners began about a year ago and now draw more than 100 persons each month. They are sponsored by Detroit Metro Chapter of the Natural Hygiene Society, a group concerned with the preservation of good health.

His schedule also includes classes in an East Detroit High School and the

Ferndale School system.

WAGNER HAD a serious weight problem about 10 years ago and was told to lose 100 pounds. He did this with a food intake recommended by Natural Hygiene Society and has managed to maintain a healthy weight since with no physical disorders.

He credits the turning point in his life to a speech made by Virginia Vetrano, in Texas, when she introduced him to an all-natural, mostly raw foods, way of eating.

"The rewards are plentiful," he said. "It's an easy way to keep weight off and a natural method of preventive medicine."

He added, "Natural Hygiene recognizes the physiological reality that digestion of different foods requires different digestive juices."

"The system provides the sound and simple guidelines for proper food combinations spelled out in literature published by American Natural Hygiene Society."
