"On Stage, Live!" a photographic exhibit by Darryl Pitt and Andy Freeberg, will be shown Feb. 9 in Tweeny's Cafe in Birmingham. Most of the photos are of performers from the 1979 Montreux Jazz Festival

They feature stars such as Count Basie, Grover Washington, Chick Corea and Herbie Hancock, both in performance and at leisure. The exhibit also includes selections from the young photographers' work at Pine Knob and other places.

Pitt and Freeberg were the '79 Montreux Festival's official photographers' the first Americans ever

montreux Festival's official photo-graphers, the first Americans ever to receive that to receive that assignment. Mon-treux is Europe's pre-eminent jazz festival — '79 was its 13th year.

THE TWEENY'S SHOWING is the US, premiere for most of the Montreux photographs, which have previously been exhibited in Geneva, Switzerland.

Pitt and Freeberg have very different styles. Pitt is more the designer. His work is theatrical in composition as well as content. Freeberg is photojournalist with

that specialty's sense of timing.
Asked to identify Montreux' most interesting photographic subject, Pitt singled out the Japanese percussion ensemble. "There were 15 to 20 semi-nude percussionists, and it's tough to choose whether the sight or the sound was the more unusual," he said.

ANOTHER HIGHLIGHT, according to the photographers was Hermato Pasquel, a Brazilian sax player whom they photographed on the Freeberg thought they were finished, when Pasquel said "I post like you wan, ton you shoot will a want." He then did a variety of 'weird acrobatics," according to Pitt. From that series, Warner Brothers Records retained several for use in Pasquel's forthcoming "Live" album.
Pitt and Freeberg have been partners since they formed Encore Photographs while students at the University of Michigan two years ago. Since then, they've photographed musicians and singers across the country. ANOTHER HIGHLIGHT, accord-

"I don't delude myself into thinking that I'm going to make or break this play," she said. "But whether I do it right or wrong, these are still all my








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
