Every season for more than 30 years, Matilda Dodge Wilson ordered new fashions from Walton Pierce.

Created of special Tabrics — some not available today — the one-of-a-kind designs were each fitted three times by the Detroit (now Grosse Pointe and Troy) firm.

Since the wealthy Avon Township resident loved hats, at least one, sometimes two, came with each outfit.

"She was beautifully groomed," recalls Mrs. John Huntington, daughter

For the first time this month, the public will get a chance to see what kind of woman Mrs. Wilson was fashinowise.

Vintage designer clothes worn by her during a 56-year period are on display through February in the ballroom of Meadow Brook Hall, where the widow of John Dodge lived with her second husband Alfred Wilson.

Some of the 30 outfirs have been seen by small groups over the past five years. They will return to storage after

One pure silk black velvet without a label was among several Mrs. Huntington identified as being from her store.

She said the style could be worn to-day, but the fabric is no longer avail-able. "You can't get pure silk black vel-vet anymore," said Mrs. Huntington, who added "you can just feel" the dif-ference in the fabric.

After shopping in New York and Europe for years, Mrs. Wilson started buying at Walton Pierce in 1934.

She occasionally purchased a ready-to-wear dress that caught her eye, but most of her clothes — suits, dresses, even furs — were purchased at the shop especially for the upcoming sea-son.

A figure of her five-foot, two-inch frame, which the designers relied on in addition to three fittings, is now owned by the Detroit Historical Society.

"Mrs. Wilson liked very simple things," recalled Mrs. Huntington. She said the owner of Meadow Brook Hall was a conservative dresser who never bought sleeveless clothes from Walton

"She always had at least three-quarter sleeves or long sleeves."

Her taste in colors was also conservative, with a special liking for lavender and pink.

"She liked softer colors, not high shades," Mrs. Huntington said.

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Many of the fashions have covered buttons and slips built into them. Mrs. Wilson always stopped in the lingeric department of Walton Pierce on her visits there, Mrs. Huntington said.

"She loved pretty things."
A quiet person, if she didn't like a fabric or design she would just shake her head no.

"She was very easy to work with," said Mrs. Huntington. "One of the easiest we ever had."
The gowns, which include her lavender engagement dress and the 1929 gold dress she wore at the Meadow Brook Hall housewarming party, can be seen at no extra charge to all guest touring Meadow Brook Hall.
